WMA Interim Board Meeting

Your National Board met in September in Louisville at the Galt House Hotel, where the 2006 WMA Convention and Professional Development Seminar will be held. All were impressed with the facilities and staff. Our fledgling chapter, KY-1, members made us all feel very welcome.

Significant votes were taken and progress made by your National Board. First, we have had some major changes in National officers due to the illness of our National President, Lou Teixeira (see article on page 1). The 1st Vice President, Lori Cousins did a wonderful job running the meeting in the absence of the National President. At the end of the meeting, the 2nd Vice President, Paula Sarlls, was appointed by the Board to be our new National President (see her message on page 3), and the Area 2 Director, Rhonda LeBrescu-Amtower, was appointed as the new 2nd Vice President. The Board has since approved the appointment of Alice Dolbear as the new Area 2 Director. (An up-to-date list of National Officers and their contact information is on page 2 of every issue of 'Nouncements.)

The Board also accepted the resignation of the Scholarship Committee Chair, Roberta Eaton. Anyone interested in this very important position should contact the new 2nd Vice President.

Nancy Wilt, the WMA National Historian, and Paula Sarlls gave a presentation on the Colorado Museum Women Marines and WMA History exhibit that recently opened in Castle Rock, CO. They and CO-1 did a fantastic job on the display and the grand opening – several National Board members were in attendance. The response to their request for articles for display has been overwhelming and the story about Montezuma Red lipstick development at Elizabeth Arden is just one element of our history that has been captured as a result of their efforts. The old WMA National history scrapbooks are in various stages of deterioration. Everything needs to be preserved, catalogued, and stored in a climate controlled area.

Their next project is to put together a traveling display for use at veterans' events around the country. Their work was so impressive that Mary Bacon Hale, our Plans and Policies Committee chair who was in attendance, offered them a \$10,000 donation on the spot. This will cover their expenses to date and begin their next year of operations.

Other important business of the Board included decisions on the management of our finances that should allow for fewer bank charges on our accounts. We also approved several Bylaws and Standing Rules changes to go to the membership for vote. The Financial Secretary's SOP is being revised based on the work being done by the contractor, and the Financial Secretary title will be submitted for change as well.

The legal officer provided an update on the paperwork changing WMA to a 501(c)(3). What has been provided to us by the lawyer working the issue needs to be revised before it can be signed by the required Board members and submitted to the state of Missouri and the IRS.

Convention 2006 plans were presented to the Board. You will notice a change in title to better reflect our schedule of events and be more relevant to our younger members who are still active duty or may still be working. But the core schedule will look very familiar to those of you who have been attending WMA conventions for years. A membership contest has been added (see details on page 12) and an essay contest (see article in a future issue).

Paul Dossin, president of the Loyal Escorts, was there to provide a report as well, and to also discuss ways in which the Loyal Escorts will be assisting us in Louisville. Judy Anderson also briefed us on the initial planning for our 2008 Convention & Professional Development Conference in Houston.

John Holvoet, our database contractor, presented his accomplishments on the WMA membership database and the provision of renewal notices that had not been sent out in at least 2 or 3 years. As a result, we have 242 reinstated memberships (22 Life, 142 2-year, and 78 1-year). He has certainly earned his pay!

The Board also discussed a proposal for professional web site management and enhancement. The funding was approved to move ahead with this project. It will include the ability for members to renew on-line, if they wish, and for new members to join through a totally electronic process. More information to follow.

We were briefed on the results of the survey in the summer 2004 issue of 'Nouncements. Your Board has a list of action items that was updated with new items and is tracked to ensure that we continue to make progress in every area where we have set goals for ourselves to continue to be Relevant, Improving and Growing.

Purple Heart recipient describes attack

It was June 23, 2005, when 20 Marines boarded a seven-ton truck and began their treacherous journey back to Camp Fallujah, Iraq. What happened a short distance down the road is something that has, and will, continue to change their lives forever.

Sitting in the second to last seat in the back, on the right side of the truck, was LCpl Erin Liberty of Niceville, FL, an ammunition technician with Ammunition Company, 2nd Supply Battalion, 2nd Force Service Support Group. She remembers talking with the female Seabee next to her, when a series of combined explosions violently lifted the truck from both sides.

"When it blew up, we all flew back and then forward again in our seats," said Liberty. "I looked at the girl next to me and saw her bounce up and down in the flames. I just closed my eyes and waited for it to end. I felt myself being thrown in the air, but my eyes remained shut. When I impacted the ground, I realized nothing hurt. I felt everything that was happening, but it was like there was a bubble around me, because when I hit the ground and woke up, I felt no pain. I looked at my hands and saw the skin hanging off my left pinky finger, but it still didn't hurt. Not then."

Lying on the ground and covered in dust, she knew it was an improvised explosive device, but it was later she learned it was constructed of five, 155-millimeter incendiary rounds and a few propane tanks, according to Liberty. They had gone off about six feet from each side of the truck.

Trying to recover from the concussion and the ringing in her ears, she looked over and saw the Seabee she had spoken too just seconds before the blast.

"She was lying next to me, unconscious," Liberty added. "I tried to pull her away from ground zero, but there was a firefight happening at the same time, so a few guys pulled me off and threw me against the wall. I wanted to go back for her, but the way the truck was positioned, it rolled over on top of her before I could."

After the firefight had died down and the injured Marines and sailors were recovered, they loaded onto another vehicle and headed straight for the Battalion Aid Station at Camp Fallujah, according to Liberty.

"We then just jumped on another seven-ton and drove away," Liberty said. "We all just sat there in silence, except for the sounds of discomfort and pain. I can still see the people with their skin hanging off of them. I remember seeing this girl with blood all over her flak jacket and the skin on her fingers falling off. Then, suddenly the silence broke, when a girl in the back of the truck started singing, Amazing Grace. I remember praying to God, and thanking Him that I was alive."

lescent leave since July 3. Not long after she went on leave, she received her Purple Heart Medal. "It was extremely hard to accept,

"It was extremely hard to accept, knowing all the people that had died," said Liberty. "It's nothing you can train or practice for, and you always receive it under the worst circumstances."

Now, she wears a neck brace to assist

When they returned to the camp, they were rushed into the surgical unit, but all the serious and critical injuries were rushed in first. Liberty walked in after everyone else, following the blood trails, she said.

They fixed both of her badly burned hands before she went back to her room. When she got there, she saw she got some packages from home that day.

"One was from my mom. She got me the most gorgeous rosary," said Liberty. "That night, I just remember lying in bed, praying to let me forget about it. I tried to sleep that night, but obviously I couldn't sleep much. All I wanted was to just wake up in the morning and feel like it didn't just happen. The whole thing just kept playing in my mind."

The next morning, she remembers waking up and thanking God, because her thoughts of the present, rather than the tragic events of the day before. She was glad to feel that, but with the morning sun came a new pain. Her neck began to hurt, so she went back to the BAS.

The doctors told Liberty she had broken cervical vertebrae in her neck and she was going to have to return to the United States.

She returned to Camp Lejeune shortly after the incident and has been on conva-

in stabilizing the break and help with the pain. She is currently recuperating from first, second and third degree burns on her hands and two black eyes in addition to her broken neck.

Liberty will undergo surgery in Florida next month, where they will put a metal plate between her C4 and C5 vertebrae in an attempt to stabilize the break.

In light of the life-altering events she's been through, she's still moving forward in her life. Liberty married on Sept. 19, after getting engaged right before she left for Iraq in February.

"It's been a rough engagement," Liberty states, with a light, but respectful chuckle.

Liberty confesses that even though it has been almost four months since the incident, she still has thoughts of that day.

"I wonder what would have happened if those guys wouldn't have pulled me away from the truck," Liberty added. "I imagine what would have happened if I had the strength to pull her away. I'm sure that will always stay with me. Honestly, my mind and my heart hurt way more than my body ever will."

If you read the story by LCpl Erin Liberty, the "Seabee" she was sitting next to was Petty Officer 1st Class Regina Clark from Centralia, WA. The 43-yr-old single mother of one was serving on her second mobilization since 2003 when she became the Navy's first female casualty of the war in Iraq. She was also a veteran of Desert Storm.

The culinary specialist volunteered to work as a sentry at an entry control point in Fallujah with Marines from II MEF.

She had been

recommended for a Navy-Marine Corps commendation medal for her outstanding work at the checkpoints. Having enlisted in the Navy in 1983, she had just received her retirement papers in May and was looking forward to retirement. Regina leaves behind her 18-yr-old son Kerry, her mother and many friends who lovingly remembered the positive, happy-go-lucky Seabee.

LCpl Holly Charette probably delivered LCpl Liberty's mail to her before that dark night. The 21-yr-old from Cranston, RI, enjoyed her time in the Corps and especially enjoyed delivering the mail. So much so that, with one year left on her contract, she was planning to continue delivering mail with the United States Post Office. Friends and family remembered Holly as a "vibrant young woman and bubbly student with sparkly brown eyes full of purpose". In high school at

Cranston East, she played field hockey and was a cheer-leader for the ice hockey team. The governor of Rhode Island ordered flags lowered to half staff after word of her death in Iraq, and paid his respects at

her funeral. Holly was engaged to a Marine, and leaves behind her mother, step-father, three brothers and a multitude of friends.

Cpl Ramona Valdez knew when she was in grade school that she wanted to join the military. Even though she loved her New York Yankees, she wanted to get out of the Bronx. A communications specialist with Headquarters Battalion, 2nd Marine Division, Ramona used her military service to persuade her mother to move out of their apartment in the Bronx and into a row house in Reading, PA; she told her if she didn't move, she was going to re-enlist

for another four years. Her mother moved, but Ramona never got to see the house. At the time of her death she had eight months left on her contract, and had filled out forms to join the Pennsylvania Highway Patrol. She died three days

before her 21st birthday. Ramona leaves behind her husband, who is also a Marine; her parents, two sisters and two nephews.

Marine Falls to Death

(Editor's Note: The following story is about a young female Marine who attended the San Diego convention and served as one of the pages for the Installation Brunch. The photo accompanying this article is from that event. She was also a member of NC-1. The story is presented to let you know the loss we have experienced.)

Sgt Tanya M. Smith died in Swansboro, N.C., 14 September, in an accidental fall at the home of a friend in Swan Harbor Condominiums near the White Oak River. The accident happened as Hurricane Ophelia was nearing the East Coast.

Smith, 27, entered the Marines after high school. She served in various posts around the world and at the time of her death was attached to Camp Lejeune.

One of Sgt Smith's commanding officers in the Installation Security and Safety Department said Smith had been willing to do whatever it takes to help protect the nation.

"Sgt. Smith answered her country's call to arms by volunteering to mobilize. As a mobilized Reserve Marine, she worked outside

of her occupational specialty, serving in Anti-terrorism and Force Protection Section at Camp Lejeune. When we lose any Marine, everybody here feels the loss. Our thoughts are with her family and we offer our deepest condolences," said Col Linda McGowan, Deputy Assistant Chief of Staff in the ISS.

Smith had been awarded numerous medals and received a number of citations. She received the Joint Navy/Marine Commendation medal, Global Anti-Terrorist medal, Armed Forces Reserve Medal, Kosovo Campaign medal, National Defense Service medal. She also received recognition for work in Haiti,

earning a Humanitarian Service medal.

Sgt Smith had been awarded a Navy Unit Commendation, a Joint Meritorious Service Medal, Certificate of Commendation, Meritorious Mast and a Navy Commendation.

Swansboro Police Chief H.C. Pugliese said an investigation into the accident is ongoing. "Tanya fell from a height of about 27 feet from a window ledge," he said. "Her injuries were consistent with a fall from that height." An autopsy showed Sgt Smith died from massive head injuries as a result of the fall.

"The accident took place in the middle of an approaching hurricane," he said. "The cause of the fall is undetermined at this time. Further, there is no foul play expected and death appears to be accidental."

Sgt Smith was buried in Rothbury, MI, with full military honors.

Ten women were honored as the *North County Times* Military Women of Merit at San Luis Rey Officer's Club at Camp Pendleton.

They are:

- Navy Lt Cmdr Patricia Hasen, who conducted six high-risk, at-sea rescues in the Indian Ocean, including one where she almost lost her life.
- Retired Navy nurse Sandy Holmes cared for Vietnam War Amputees, inspiring one man who lost both legs to find a reason to stay alive.
- Navy Lt Natalie Hill, a flight surgeon and medical department head for the Marine Medium Helicopter Squadron 268 who provided casualty evacuation support in Iraq for seven months.
- Mary Ann Hillery, wife of a retired U.S. Marine colonel and an avid volunteer for miliary assistance programs. Hillery has been involved with the Navy-Marine Corps Relief Society, Toys for Tots and Operation Homefront.
- Joan Pollard, the wife of a man who spent six years in Vietnam as a prisoner of war. She was one of the leaders in a national campaign to bring war prisoners home
- Retired Marine LtCol Lillian Hagener Bell, who had a record-setting, 36-year

career with the Marines. Bell now is active in Oceanside promotion, working as a city greeter and a Chamber of Commerce ambassador.

- Marine 1stLt Erin Kilroy, a logistics officer with the 15th Marine Expeditionary Unit at Camp Pendleton. She was the only female member of her unit to plan and execute numerous amphibious deliveries of equipment in Kuwait and Iraq.
- Marine Capt. Jessica Moore, one of the few women in the world flying the Cobra helicopters.
- Marine Sgt. Kathleen Ocampo, a mechanic operator who was praised for her "uncanny" mechanical aptitude In Iraq. She covered more than 2,400 miles caring for transport vehicles in dangerous conditions.
- Retired Marine 1stSgt Peggy Reiber, who served from 1973 to 1996. She was the first woman in several of the positions where she served, including at the Marine Barracks in Alameda. She is now the executive director of the Boys & Girls Clubs of Vista.

Racing Terminology for the Convention

When you get into the convention articles in this issue, you may be a bit confused by some of the terminology. Here is an explanation of what and why things have been called what they are being called.

1. The majority of horse owners keep their horses in a "stall" which is usually in the shape of a box. We can assume our fillies and stallions will be staying in these stalls, which humans call "rooms" at the Galt House Hotel. They are cleaned daily keeping them clean and neat using beddings made out of shavings (feathers

for humans) to be comfortable.

- 2. Our horses need a place to keep their saddle, bridle, grooming tools, horse blanket, and other items. This storage place is called a "tack room", which was formerly called the Boutique and now the WMA-PX. The name Tack Room is just for this convention.
- 3. Having a safe, enclosed place to work, play, and eat is extremely important for our fillies. Multiple "arenas" (banquet, meeting rooms) serve this purpose.
- 4. Few things are more relaxing, fun, and soul-enhancing as a gallop/jog/walk than

along the Ohio River trail. The connection between the rider and her horse in a rhythmic step to a sung cadence with the wind blowing your horse's mane and tail helps to melt the stress of a long journey away. (No, you really won't be riding horses; just bring walking/running hooves...uh, shoes.)

5. After being cooped up all day in a stall, our horses will have a chance to move around in a "corral" giving them more opportunities to socialize and meet at the water trough, otherwise known as the Hospitality Room.

Our history has proven to be of interest to all who visit the museum; now comes the next phase and we need your help. Tragedy Internet Scams

Hurricane Katrina has spawned more than misery and destruction--a new wave of scam e-mails and websites are exploiting the tragedy. Phony web sites and e-mails, purporting to offer help to hurricane victims or provide more news on the destruction, are making their rounds on the Internet.

One spam campaign that's circulating offers breaking news reports but tricks people into clicking a link that takes them to a bogus website, according to security firm Sophos. The site attempts to exploit vulnerabilities in Internet Explorer and install malicious code, including the Troj/Cgab-A Trojan horse, on a victim's system.

Some of these e-mails carry subject headers such as "re: g8 Tropical storm flooded New Orleans" and "re: q1 Katrina killed as many as 80 people."

"If users click on the link contained inside the e-mail, they will be taken to a malicious Web site which will try and infect their computer," Graham Cluely, senior technology consultant for Sophos, said in a statement. "Once infected, the computer is under the control of remote criminal hackers who can use it to spy, steal or cause disruption."

Other bogus e-mails are circulating that ask people to aid hurricane victims and their families by clicking on a PayPal button to make a donation, said Johannes Ullrich, chief research officer for the Sans Institute. "They're using PayPal because it allows them to be more anonymous. But if you reply and ask them for their address to mail the check, they don't respond," Ullrich said.

He advised people to ask the organization for its nonprofit tax ID before making a donation. That ID number can be checked against the database housed by the Internal Revenue Service. Consumers should also review the list of reputable nonprofit agencies posted on the Federal Emergency Management Agency Web site, he said.

Currently, there are 106 Web sites that are registered with the name Katrina and hurricane, weather, disaster, relief or fund included in the domain, according to security monitoring company Websense. Of those, roughly a third lack original content and have notices indicating they are under construction, coming soon, or the domains are up for sale, Websense said.

AR-1 Arkansas Diamond

Thirty years ago on 31 May 1975, a group of 14 women met at the Holiday Inn, North Little Rock to form the 54th chapter of the Women Marines Association. Among them, the newly elected National Vice President, Nita Bob Warner (a native daughter of Arkansas). The chapter name, Arkansas Diamond, was suggested by Nita Bob and adopted by the group. They presented gifts to women veteran patients. (Our members in the Little Rock area have aged along with the chapter and are no longer physically able to perform this volunteer service). Magazines and handmade afghans for veterans at the Fayetteville VA are currently being provided by members, along with volunteer work.

The chapter usually had members representing AR-1 at the national conventions. A boutique selling jewelry was set up by our members, with proceeds from sales supporting volunteer work at Arkansas VA hospitals. TV's, books, hairdryers, clothing and reading material have all been donated by chapter members over the years. One member in particular - Nina Brown and her husband - were instrumental in obtaining over \$3160 in comfort and toiletry items donated from Merchandise Mart in Harrison. Contributions have also been made to the WMA scholarship program and WIMSA.

AR-1 members have received numerous awards for volunteer leadership service over the years.

One of our chapter presidents, Opal Lovelace Blakeslee, was elected Area 6 Director in 1983. She served two tours as Area 6 Director. A BIG accomplishment for several AR-1 members in Northern Arkansas was helping to bring medical services to veterans in Northern Arkansas. Their cooperation with other service groups enabled an outlying veterans' clinic to be opened in Mountain Home in 2000. This eliminated the need for veterans to make the long drive to Little Rock for treatment.

The Arkansas Diamond Chapter has slowed down a bit over the years but is still alive and as long as new members come aboard and are active members, AR-1 will continue.

With the increase of injured Marines being treated at Brooke Army Medical Center (BAMC) at Ft. Sam Houston in San Antonio, the Marine Medical Liaison office became fully functioning in May of 2005. The Marines get the best possible medical care from the hospital staff, but the Marines assigned to the

liaison office take care of everything else, including families.

In July, WMA received unofficial notice that seven female Marines were being sent to BAMC for treatment of injuries received in Iraq. They joined one female Marine already there. These eight young Marines were the recipients of an amazing show of concern and support from across the country. Within a few days of their arrival they received 45 homemade cards from high school students in Las Vegas, sent by a WMA member. Then the money started pouring in. A large portion of this money was spent on the rental of a van for five weeks to be used by the Liaison office to transport the Marines and their families. This was at the request of the liaison office. They have now been able to obtain military transportation. There were care boxes from Las Vegas, southern California, and coastal Texas, and others that weren't delivered by me so I can't give credit where it's due. Many people included gift cards or calling cards in their envelopes. Some of this was shared with the male Marines, with the senders' permission, as there was plenty to go around.

As the women Marines became outpatients, there was more contact with local WMA members. In late August, the women Marines were treated to dinner on San Antonio's Riverwalk by the local Marine Corps League detachment. After dinner, the local WMA chapter provided tickets for a guided tour of the river, and they were each given a VISA gift card purchased with the remainder of the donations from WMA.

As of this writing, three of the Marines have returned to full duty. The remaining five could be here for several months, receiving therapy for their burns. Their morale is still high, but they will always enjoy getting cards. TX-2 sent them each a copy of the 2005 WMA Historical Calendar, and they have enjoyed studying the pictures. 
> for them. If you work, give your boss a calendar; build support for WMA.

Armed Forces Retirement Home

Veterans are eligible to become AFRH residents if their active duty service in the military was at least 50 percent enlisted, warrant officer or limited duty officer and they are:

- Veterans with 20 or more years of active duty service and are at least 60 years old, or
- Veterans unable to earn a livelihood due to a service-connected disability, or
- Veterans unable to earn a livelihood due to injuries, disease, or disability, and who served in a war theater or received hostile fire pay, or
- Female veterans who served prior to 1948.

Applicants must be free of drug, alcohol, and psychiatric problems, and never have been convicted of a felony. Married couples are welcome, but both must be eligible in their own right.

At the time of admission applicants must be able to live independently. As an example of this, they must be able to take care of their own personal needs, attend a central dining facility for meals and keep all medical appointments. If increased health care is needed after being admitted, assisted living and long term care are available at both campuses.

Sample fees: Resident Fees for Armed Forces Retirement Home – Washington are as follows:

- 1. Independent living residents, 35 percent of total current income, but not to exceed \$1,063 each month
- 2. Assisted living residents, 40 percent of total current income, but not to exceed \$1,595 each month.
- 3. Long-term care residents, 65 percent of total current income, but not to exceed \$2,658 each month.

In the wake of Hurricane Katrina, the Gulfport, LA, residents were successfully evacuated: independent and assisted living residents to the Washington campus; long term care residents to the Lynnwood

Nursing Home in Mobile, AL.

The residents and staff wish to thank everyone for their generous donations for the Gulfport veterans who weathered Katrina. All items on our original "wish list" have been donated, but they still need winter clothing such as hats, gloves, scarves, sweaters, jackets and coats.

The home is expanding their "Adopt a Veteran" program to match volunteers with veterans. While the residents in assisted living and long-term care programs always welcome visitors, our independent living residents are also eager to go to a ball game, visit a museum, attend a concert, go shopping and engage in other activities in the Capital area.

Foxx ("Ray", "Collateral") plays a hardcharger who leads his sniper platoon into battle. They're also joined by Chris Cooper ("American Beauty", "The Patriot") and Peter Sarsgaard ("Skeleton Key", "Kinsey") in a star-filled cast that brings the movie an air of credibility.

'Homes for Our Troops' recognized in Newman's Own Awards program

Seeing servicemembers return from battlefields in Iraq and Afghanistan missing arms and legs or paralyzed was so heartrending for Victoria Mosier that she quit her full-time job to help improve their quality of life.

Mosier started working with her son, John S. Gonsalves, 38, president of "Homes for Our Troops," an organization he founded in February 2004 to build or adapt homes to the needs of severely wounded servicemen and women.

Their compassion for America's severely wound combatants garnered them second place and a \$7,500 check in the Newman's Own Awards competition.

The annual competition is sponsored by Newman's Own, the Fisher House Foundation and the Military Times Media Group. Volunteer organizations that support military communities are challenged to present an innovative plan supporting military families and receive a share of a \$50,000 grant to carry out that plan.

Eleven volunteer organizations out of 177 entries were selected as winners for the award.

"Thousands of Americans have sustained life-altering injuries, and they need to have a home suited to their disabilities," she said. "We want to meet their special needs so they can maneuver around the house that just doesn't fit them any more. If they already own a home, we'll go in and adapt it based on their injury."

The group is completing its first home in Middleboro, Mass., and five more projects are under way.

Homes for Our Troops helps injured servicemen and women and their immediate families by raising donations of money, building materials and professional labor. The organization also coordinates the process of building a new home or adapting an existing home for handicapped accessibility.

The group's coffers are filled through fundraisers and corporate, business and individual donations. For instance, Mosier said, professional golfer Phil Mickelson, the 2004 Masters champion, "is playing his PGA tour for our troops. He gives \$100 for every birdie and \$500 for every eagle (he shoots)." Singer and songwriter Billy Joel made a \$10,000 contribution to Homes for Our Troops, Mosier said.

Mosier said her son was a laid-off construction contractor when he decided to use his building expertise to build and renovate homes for war-wounded veterans of the global war on terrorism.

"Our goal is to help those who come to us," Mosier noted. "It doesn't matter where they're from or what branch of service they're in; if we can help them, that's what we want to do."

"We want to be here as long as the need is there," she added.

mobile will help the rescue services quickly contact a friend or relative - which could be vital in a life or death situation. It only takes a few seconds to do, and it could easily help save your life. Why not put ICE in your phone now? Simply select your person to contact in case of emergency, enter them under the word "ICE" and the telephone number of the person you wish to be contacted.

Paramedics will turn to a victim's cell phone for clues to that person's identity. You can make their job much easier with a simple idea that they are trying to get everyone to adopt: ICE.

We have members serving in all types of appointed areas in their states. The latest to come to our attention are Elva Pounders and Ellen Leidy, who are on the Governor's Advisory Board for Women Veterans for the State of Ohio. Elva has been on it for over year and Ellen started in September.

National President Paula Sarlls has been appointed by the governor of Colorado to the Fitzsimons State Veterans Nursing Home Advisory Board. The board replaces the Fitzsimons State Veterans Nursing Home Accountability Committee that was created through an executive order of the governor in October 2004. The new board will continue to monitor progress toward ensuring resident safety and financial viability at the Fitzsimons State Veterans Nursing Home. The new board will make recommendations and provide regular updates to the State Board of Veteran Affairs.

Hurricane Ophelia did more than \$1 million worth of damage to Camp Lejeune -- half of that at Riseley Pier alone, a base spokesman said. The pier off the coast of Onslow Beach suffered about \$650,000 in damage and was the most significant storm damage the base suffered.

The rest of the costs include fixing electrical infrastructure such as downed power lines, roof repairs and debris cleanup. Many repairs have been made, and work is being done as fast as possible to make any others, especially those involving quality of life for the Marines. *Jacksonville (NC) Daily News*

The Department of Defense announced a significant increase in

the death gratuity for the survivors of service members killed in action and the Servicemembers' Group Life Insurance (SGLI) coverage for service members deployed to designated combat zones.

The Emergency Supplemental Appropriations Act for Defense, the Global War on Terror and Tsunami Relief Act 2005 (Public Law 109-13) increases this immediate cash payment from \$12,420 to \$100,000 for survivors of those whose death is as a result of hostile actions and occurred in a designated combat operation or combat zone or while training for combat or performing hazardous duty.

The supplemental also increases the maximum amount of SGLI coverage from \$250,000 to \$400,000 for all service members effective Sept. 1, 2005 and provides that the department will pay or reimburse the premiums to service members, who are deployed in a designated combat zone for \$150,000 of SGLI coverage.

The Secretary of Defense has designated all areas where service members are in receipt of the combat zone tax exclusion as qualifying combat zones and all members deployed outside the United States on orders in support of Operation Enduring Freedom or Operation Iraqi Freedom as participating in qualifying combat operations

The services will also identify eligible survivors of service members who died in these designated zones and operations since October 7, 2001 and begin making the retroactive payments within a few days.

Survivors of members who did not die in a designated combat operation or combat zone, but were training for combat or performing hazardous duty, will also qualify for the increased benefits.

Funeral Detail: 14 April 1945

One day I found myself watching the Discovery Channel on television. The show was about a segment of Franklin Roosevelt's life, primarily his presidency and death. It was a very interesting show.

As it moved along into his death and funeral, it got more interesting. Actual footage of his funeral procession showed a platoon of women Marines (WRs) just ahead of the caisson.

Now, I'm not the most knowledgeable person on our history, so this was new to me. I knew some of our members participated in his funeral, I just didn't realize this was how they participated. So, naturally, the first thing that came to mind was, "gee, I think I'll put something in the newsletter about this and see if we have any members who were in that platoon."

A few days later, the below (unedited) letter appeared in my mailbox:

"Dear Sondra,

I read the 'Nouncements nearly cover to cover--don't always read the other units news. You people do really fine job for the Association.

I am a charter member of the Arkansas chapter and a life member of the WMA. I served from December 1943 to December

Koering, and I were assigned to Company F, Hdqrs. Battalion, Henderson Hall from January of 1944. We believe our greatest honor as members of the Women Marines was to be selected to march in the funeral procession of President Roosevelt in April

of 1945. As I recall 100 girls were selected from our battalion and they had to be at least 5'6" tall. We met the caisson at Union Station and proceeded down Pennsylvania Avenue to the White House. We were hoping that perhaps in your new feature "Searching for..." someone might have some pictures or data of interest. Or, alternatively, it might be an article of interest if you could find enough survivors. Would there be a list in the archives of the Marines

who marched? We think we were Franklin Delano Roosevelt behind the caisson and a picture might confirm our position in the formation. They also may have made a newsreel for the the-

aters that showed them at that time.

Fund Helps Children, Spouses of Troops

Rebecca Campbell started the Children of Fallen Soldiers Relief Fund (CFSRF) in 2003 to raise college tuition for the children of servicemembers killed in the war on terrorism. The fund has since expanded to encompass other financial needs. It now aims to provide a wide range of assistance to the children and spouses of troops who have been killed or injured.

"These funds may be awarded to applicants of U. S. military families who are in need of assistance with housing, utilities, medical expenses, groceries, clothing, school supplies and other expenses deemed necessary in order to provide them with some support and alleviate their need," Campbell said.

She said she feels a real need for this type of allocation because of the financial void often experienced by a death in a military family. "Often, when a loss occurs in these families, what was a two person income becomes one. The financial hardships placed on these families are very difficult to deal with," she said.

CFSRF raises money through direct donations and fundraisers. The organization began collecting donations in May 2004, Campbell said.

"Through the generosity of the public we have raised a little over \$85,000 and have kept administrative costs in 2004 to less than 9 percent," Campbell said. "All proceeds go directly to qualified families."

The nonprofit organization has also received the help of country singer Brad Cotter, the 2004 winner of USA Network's show "Nashville Star." The fund has been chosen as the beneficiary of a portion of the proceeds from Cotter's new single, "An

American Dream," Campbell said.

CFSRF is made up exclusively of volunteers, and in an effort to keep expenses to a minimum Campbell does most work, such as Web site design, IRS filings, printing, advertising and mailings from her home, she said.

Campbell noted that none of the organization's board members has been affected personally by the loss of a servicemember. Campbell said her son, David, 25, served in Iraq for a year with the 82nd Airborne.

"I cannot begin to explain the fearful and sleepless nights during his year of deployment." she said.

"The Children of Fallen Soldiers Relief Fund is simply a group of individuals who have a tremendous amount of respect for our servicemen and women," she said. "We are an enthusiastic group of family, friends and business people who choose to never forget the sacrifices made by others on our behalf."

CFSRF began taking applications from military families in January and granted its first round of awards, totaling \$17,000, to families in California, Pennsylvania and Indiana in June.

Campbell concedes that there is no way to erase the pain of losing a loved one, but she still aims to lessen the blow.

"There is no substitute for a parent, but we strive to ease their pain and suffering and honor the memories of our fallen soldiers," she said. "I realize only too fully that each and every day that I have to live as a free person is only because of them and their sacrifices as well as their families."
