

As we head into the summer, your National Board of Directors (BOD) will be hard at work as we gather for the Interim Board Meeting (IBM) in Philadelphia at the Hyatt Hotel at Penn's Landing. This is also the location of the

2012 WMA Biennial Convention and Professional Development Conference. So we will be "killing two birds with one stone" so to speak as we meet to conduct the business of WMA and continue the convention planning process.

One big topic of discussion at the IBM will be the status and future disposition of the Women of the Corps Collection (WOCC). For your information, effective 2 June 2011 ownership of the Women of the Corps Collection, previously known as the CO-1 WOC History Preservation Project, was officially transferred from the CO-1 Chapter to WMA National.

Many of you saw a great representation of the Collection at the Convention last year in Denver. The CO-1 chapter began the project back in 2005 to help

support WMA's number one purpose of helping to preserve the history of women in the Marine Corps. The project quickly outgrew its original design and the decision was made to transfer the ownership and management control to the national level. This is a learning experience so we are taking our time to conduct due diligence and to develop appropriate procedures for its future disposition.

Remember, the 2012 WMA Biennial Convention is only one year away.

I would like to extend a special thanks to the CO-1 chapter for initiating this special project. They recently made a commitment to donate \$1,000 to WMA to initiate the new program and would like to challenge all chapters to donate \$50-\$100 a year towards the Collection.

donation is specifically for the WOCC and it will be earmarked specifically and solely for that purpose.

Stay tuned for the next issue of 'Nouncements' where I will provide a report on the results of your national team hard at work. 1st Vice President's Message: Chapter Survey Project Underway



During the 2010 convention in Denver, the Area Directors were tasked with determining the strength of their chapters.

Kathy Wright developed a Chapter Survey that has

been used. The survey seeks information regarding the number of chapter members, frequency of meetings, membership status of the members, dues status of members, officer roles, and duties of the officers. Most Area Directors asked each chapter to complete the survey and return it to her. The Area Directors send the surveys to me for review and I will report to the WMA Board during the Interim Board Meeting. The

purpose of the survey is to determine the strength of WMA chapters, which ones are growing, which ones are stable and identify the ones needing help. The Membership Secretary and Public Relations Officer are available to chapter officers needing help getting visibility for their chapter. The WMA website, www.womenmarines.org , is available to all chapters for announcements of upcoming events and activities. The Membership Secretary and PR Officer can also assist chapters with identifying new members and how to reach out to active duty members.

As WMA does this evaluation, some growing pains should be expected. We had two chapters identified as candidates for revocation of their charter; there had been no contact from chapter officers during the past two years. When the

Area Directors contacted the members in the chapter about the possibility of losing the chapters, there was interest in keeping the chapter active and a search for chapter officers was begun. There may be other chapters in a similar situation, and we hope the chapter members will work to keep their chapters. It may not be an option for all chapters, but disbanding a chapter should be considered only when other options are not available.

Many thanks to Kathy Wright for preparing the survey, and sharing it with her fellow Area Directors. Her leadership with this project has been awesome. Thanks to the Area Directors and chapter officers for ensuring these surveys were completed.

This proved to be a very popular story with so many calls and contacts on how much everyone enjoyed this look at World War II. Part of that story was locating Jack Misseldine, alive at 88 years young in the South of France.

Since the article, I contacted Jack and his family by email. Much to my surprise, as I was working on another Women of the Corps project, my phone rang and a very British voice introduced himself as Jack, calling from his home in France. What a surprise for me. It was a fascinating call; Jack remembered his time training in the States and getting to know Ann Workman. Jack has indicated that he will gather photos of that time in the US and send them on to us.

The Women of the Corps Collection (WOCC) has had Ann's scrapbook professionally copied and is sending it to Jack. Towards the end of the war, Jack and Ann lost track of each other and Jack was thrilled to learn what had happened to Ann. We are also putting Jack in touch with Ann's family (with their permission). This has turned out to be a wonderful story with many happy endings.

Once again, may thanks to Wanda Antoine for locating Jack.

WOCC Supporting 4th Recruit Training Battalion, PI, SC

Contacted by Colonel Marta, the Battalion Commander, and then by Captain LeValley, Executive Officer, the WOCC curator sent a database of photos (some 400) for selection and use in a de-decoration of the battalion lobby. Formerly decorated by the photos of past commanders, the area needed a refreshing look. The desired new photos have been selected and are being worked by PI's Combat Photo.

In addition all the old photos of the commanding officers and Sergeants Major for the battalion are being forwarded to the curator and deputy curator. These will be preserved and then placed in one or more archival scrapbooks for return to the 4th Battalion. Proper preservation of these photos will ensure many

decades of availability to future generations of Marines.

Assisting the curator was the collection's photographic and oral historian Micaila Britto, who volunteered to rephotograph historic photos to improve pixel quality for the photo combat unit as needed. Thanks, Mic.

Supporting the Sea Services Leadership Association (SSLA)

The Sea Services Leadership Association is open to women of the Navy, Marine Corps and Coast Guard. This year their convention was attended by Area 10 Director Kathy Wright. (*Please see her report on the conference in this issue*).

Luckily, Kathy had told me of her trip and a few months later when contacted by the SSLA, I had full knowledge of them as an organization. The SSLA was requesting the WOCC help in developing a slide show of photos showing all the services from WWI to current day. The curator of the WOCC customized a selection of 156 photos covering World War I through our Female Engagement Teams in Afghanistan. Our photos will be combined with the Navy and Coast Guard pictures and will be presented at various programs and events, providing a unique look at the history of women in the sea services.

Off We Go to the National Museum of the Marine Corps

The curator, deputy curator and photographic specialist went to the National Museum of the Marine Corps in June to set-up our first exhibit at this venerable institution. Lin Ezill, Director of the Museum has had us busy for the last 3 months developing the Women of the Corps Exhibit that will be a companion exhibit to a national tour of When Janey Comes Marching Home Again, the stories of women currently in military services. The WOCC exhibit will consist of all eras of women Marines from World War I through today. This case exhibit includes a professionally designed backdrop of images and a timeline courtesy of Russ Slocum & Associates, a mannequin with complete World War I uni-



forms and some 21 other artifacts from the WOCC. WMA members and families of WMA members, who have generously donated these historical items, have been notified of their artifacts being on display.

You are all invited to tour the Women of the Corps Exhibit, which runs until 8 October, 2011 in the second deck exhibit area of the National Museum of the Marine Corps in Quantico, VA.

Joint Women's Leadership Symposium

On 14 and 15 March 2011, over 100 active duty female Marines joined 1,200 other female service members in attending the Joint Women's Leadership Symposium which was hosted by the Sea Service Leadership Association (SSLA). Attendees representing the Army, Navy, Air Force, Marine Corps and Coast Guard came together to CON-NECT, EMPOWER, and SUCCEED which was the theme for this year's symposium. Day one found all 1,300 attendees meeting together to hear motivational speakers such as Ambassador Melanne Verveer, Ambassador- at-large for Global Women's Issues and Ms. Geena Davis, American actress, film producer, writer, former fashion model, and a women's Olympics archery team semi-finalist.

At noon, all 1300 attendees moved into a large tent for lunch, the presentation of leadership awards and a speech by Ms. Tammy Duckworth, former Assistant Secretary for Public and Intergovernmental Affairs in the United States Department of Veterans Affairs. Ms. Duckworth was an Army black hawk pilot serving in Iraq when an rocket propelled grenade struck her aircraft causing her to lose both legs.

In spite of her injuries, the pilots were able to safely land the helicopter and prevent additional injuries to the crew. To say that she was an inspirational speaker would be an understatement. In spite of injuries which left her with two artificial legs, she refused to accept a disability pension, has remained in the Army Reserve, has earned a civilian pilot license and continues to work on behalf of military veterans every day.

The Marine Corps, Navy, Air Force and Coast Guard presented leadership awards to their outstanding female leaders. The Marine Corps winners were presented with the Major Megan McClung Leadership Award by Major General Tracy Garrett who is currently serving as the Commanding General, 4th Marine Logistics Group, and is a life member of WMA. The senior officer award was presented to Lieutenant Colonel Katherine M. McDonald, Staff

Judge Advocate, MCB, Camp Lejeune; the junior officer award was presented to Captain Lorena Childers, MARFOR-RES Staff Secretary, Marine Forces Reserve and a member of WMA; and the senior enlisted award was presented to Sergeant Major Laura Brown, MAG 36, 1st MAW, Okinawa, Japan, and a life member of WMA. Congratulations to all of these exceptional Marines. The winners also received a two year membership from WMA in recognition of their achievements.

Day one also provided the attendees with two panel discussions that were informative and gave attendees an opportunity to ask questions. The morning panel was on "Women Building Global Security and Stability" and was moderated by Ms. Elisabeth Bumiller, a *New York Times* journalist. Panelists included several civilian women who work in various security fields and our own Lieutenant Colonel Julie Nether-

two 2-star and one 1-star general officers including our own Maj.Gen. Tracy Garrett. The moderator asked excellent questions which the panel answered openly and honestly and then the panel fielded questions from the floor. It was very interesting to hear of some of the challenges these women had faced as they moved up in rank and were assigned to command organizations that were previously commanded only by men. Some of these women were married and had to handle both career and family demands and some were single. It just proved that women experience challenges at all levels and they can be met and overcome.

In the evenings, there were networking socials where women from all the services could meet, exchange experiences, develop new sources, acquire information from various sponsors and enjoy live entertainment. A Navy rock band called The Destroyers performed on

cot, Commanding Officer, 9th Communication Battalion. Lt.Col. Nethercot was instrumental in forming and training the Female Engagement Teams currently performing so successfully in Afghanistan. She told the attendees that they expected the women to be successful in dealing with local women, but a surprise benefit was that the local men viewed the FET members as a "third" and non-threatening sex and were therefore willing to communicate with the women more openly than with the male Marines.

In the afternoon, LCDR Jean Marine Sullivan, Director of Naval Personnel's Office of Women's Policy, served as moderator for the Female General Officer Panel which included general officers from each of the major services. The panel was comprised of two 3-star,

the 13th and a combo from the USMC Southern California Marine Band on the 14th. Additionally, Tamara Sanchez, Randy Tidmore and Nancy Brock from Chapter CA-2 set up a WMA table at noon on the 14th and handed out many applications for WMA. In the evening, Tamara Sanchez and Kathy Wright, the Area 10 Director manned the table at the social and met many wonderful ladies from not only the Marine Corps, but also from the other services. Congratulations to CA-2 for a job well done.

On day two of the symposium, each of the services split and held sessions to address service specific topics. The Marine Corps started with a motivational speech by Lieutenant General Dennis J. Hejlik, Commander, U.S. Marine Forces Command. (Continued on next page)

The general discussed the importance mentoring by officers, SNCOs, and NCOs. This is a topic of particular value to the female Marines because they are integrated into male dominated units where availability of female mentors is often very limited. This theme continued through presentations by Lieutenant General Carol Mutter, USMC (Ret) and Major General Angela Salinas,

Director, Manpower Management Division, HQMC. We had female Marines of all ranks from Pfc. through Lt.Gen. representing commands on both coasts and Okinawa. They learned that there are also mentoring organizations such as "Academy Women" who can provide one-on-one mentoring by women of similar backgrounds.

In the afternoon, we split into officer and enlisted groups and this was where the rubber met the road. Instead of a formal panel discussion, all the enlisted personnel gathered in an informal set-



ting where junior personnel could ask any question relating to their careers and the questions were handled by the SNCOs. It was perhaps the first time the junior personnel had been given access to that much mentoring from women who had experienced all the same challenges they were facing and could offer meaningful solutions or suggestions. The questions addressed problems with online service records, handling child care issues, service on the drill field, getting stationed with or away from husbands, etc. It was a very

beneficial and informative session.

Next year, the Joint Women's Leadership Symposium will be held in Washington. D.C. This program is endorsed by the Marine Corps and HQMC funded 50 attendees to this conference. If you are interested in attending this excellent symposium, be sure to submit your request as soon as the MARADMIN is published because the

openings are rapidly filled. Local commands may also sponsor attendance if they have available funding.

My husband, Second Lieutenant Joshua Welch, was first in contact with the Women Marines Association and Paula Sarlls back in 2009 when he ran their annual 5k. My husband returned from the 5k with Paula's business card and an invitation to apply for their scholarship: an invitation he was actively seeking. Joshua (then SSgt Welch), was going through the Marine Enlisted Commissioning Education Program (MECEP) at that time and was looking for opportunities to network, meet new people, exercise his opportunities for growth and find scholarships to cover some of the non-covered expenses of his experience at the University of Colorado Denver.

Joshua enlisted in the United States Marine Corps in May 2002, after attempts to apply to several academies were met with denial or without the right resources to go to. What I find so amazing about my husband (one of the things) is that at the moment he enlisted, he knew he would find a way to make his continued dream of being a Marine Corps officer a reality one day. In October 2006, he was accepted into the MECEP program and started at CU Denver the next fall.

Months later, Joshua received that scholarship through WMA. The following May, Joshua graduated with a



degree in Finance from CU Denver and commissioned from CU Boulder with the NROTC program. At the commissioning ceremony, he received the first ever 2ndLt James J. Cathey award, given to the commissioned Marine who exhibits exceptional leadership skills.

After commissioning, Joshua went on to complete the Basic School for Officers (TBS) in Quantico, VA followed by the General Supply Officer School (GSOC) at Camp Johnson. At TBS, he placed in the top 10 percent of his class and was # 2 in his class at GSOC. We are now stationed at Camp Lejeune in Jacksonville, NC. Joshua works as a Supply Officer for 2nd Marine Regiment, Headquarters Company.





Our organization has accomplished several significant actions during this reporting period. Probably the most significant is the award of the Father

Charles Covert Memorial Scholarship to Kelly M. Davidson of Cincinnati, Ohio. Kelly will use this scholarship to attend Butler University. Loyal Escorts provides this annual scholarship to a student who is selected through the WMA Scholarship Program.

Membership Cards

Another accomplishment during this period was the search for, and selection of, a new permanent life member card. In the past (up until the latter part of the last decade), Loyal Escorts provided life members with a metal card that designated life membership, but the card was not personalized. Our search led us to choose a bonded plastic card that will be personalized to include the life member's name, life member number, and year that the member joined Loyal Escorts. The new card, which will include a full-color logo and a red border, is the size and shape of a standard credit card, but thinner.

There is a single entry from the parking lot which is secure and a manager's office on site. We hope this is just the beginning of such housing for women veterans all over the country.

Hesitation Kills: Marine Writes an Unforgettable Narrative of Her Iraqi Experiences



Jane describes not only her experiences as a young lieutenant and as a woman but also those of her fellow Marines, whom she lauds as the true heroes of her story. Ultimately, she learns from her commanding officer, and her fellows in arms, what it truly means to be a leader, both in the military and in life. Weaving her story together with the experiences of the ordinary people of Iraq, this book offers compelling insights into the profound impact of the war on the lives of service members and civilians alike. Jane also weaves in the narrative her impressions of the Iraqis and draws the reader in to her changed perceptions and growing understanding of Muslims and Iraqis as a whole. Her unforgettable narrative bridges the gap between those who have experienced the Iraq War firsthand and those in America who could only follow its life-altering events from a distance.

Marines in Afghanistan run in honor of fallen sister

CAMP LEATHERNECK, Afghanistan —

More than 500 U.S. Marines and deployed troops participated in a 5-kilometer memorial run to honor the life and service of Maj. Megan McClung at Camp Leatherneck, Afghanistan, Aug. 13.

McClung, a public affairs officer, was the first female Marine Corps officer to die in combat in Iraq. She was killed Dec. 6, 2006, by an improvised explosive device in Al Anbar province, where she served with I Marine Expeditionary Force.

Lt. Cmdr. Rachel Oden graduated with McClung from the United States Naval Academy in 1995. Oden, a physical therapist with the Concussion Restoration Care Clinic on Camp Leatherneck, organized the memorial run here with the help of other volunteers.

"To be able to say I knew her and to be here doing something to honor her memory and all the good things she did is a big honor for me," said Oden, a native of Casa Grande, Ariz. "Megan was a big runner. She was an avid athlete and tri-athlete. It's just something she loved doing."

In 2002 while serving as a public affairs officer with the 2nd Marine Aircraft Wing, McClung was named as athlete of the year for Marine Corps Air Station Cherry Point, N.C.

During her yearlong deployment to Iraq, which ultimately ended in her death, Mc-Clung helped to organize a variant of the Marine Corps Marathon for deployed troops. She also ran in the race, finishing second amongst female competitors.

The first memorial run in McClung's honor was held in 2007 at Naval Air Station Whidbey Island, Wash., near her parents' home in Coupeville. The race has been carried on annually in Washington, with deployed troops simultaneously participating in Iraq in 2009, and Afghanistan in 2010 and 2011.

"There was a memorial run last year on Leatherneck and her folks are putting together a run in her hometown this weekend as well," said Oden. "People around the world are running to honor her memory. I would love for us to continue this tradition."

"It's always great to run in memory of someone," said Master Sgt. Michael Noble, the senior enlisted advisor for Marine Wing Headquarters Squadron 2, and a native of Suffolk, Va. "The amount of people that ran today for her is great."

Prior to the start of the race at Camp Leatherneck, Oden asked for any runners who knew McClung to raise their hands. Dozens responded.

"There were quite a few people that knew Megan and even more that know her story," said Oden. "The fact that her spirit is still alive and inspiring people is awesome."

Bakersfield, Calif. twins serve together in Afghanistan

CAMP LEATHERNECK, Afghanistan — Serving in Afghanistan usually means being away from family for several months. For identical twin sisters Lance Cpls. Ashley Sallee and Kimberley Gastelum, however, being deployed to Helmand province has brought them closer together.

The 22-year-old sisters, of Bakersfield, Calif., are currently serving together at Camp Leatherneck. Sallee is deployed with II Marine Expeditionary Force Headquarters Group's Maintenance Platoon as a clerk, while Gastelum is a construction wireman with Alpha Company, 8th Communication Battalion.

"I got here in late January and Ashley got here in February," said Gastelum. "I was glad when I heard she was coming out here. It was a nice surprise."

Despite being with different units, the sisters find plenty of opportunities to see each other.

"We usually work out and eat lunch together," Sallee explained. "And Saturdays we usually get together for breakfast. It's nice being able to talk with my sister about work and stuff going on at home. It helps a lot."

The two sisters ended up being deployed together by chance.

"I wanted to do a deployment here," said Gastelum. "I wanted to try something different."

"I knew my sister was going over here, but I was initially told I wouldn't be deploying," Sallee said. "Then out of the blue, my chain of command told me I was going to Camp Leatherneck, and I couldn't believe it."

Both sisters have found their work here tough, but rewarding.

"I enjoy it," Gastelum said. "I get to crawl around in ceiling vents and dig trenches for the telephone lines. Somehow we make it fun."

"My job has ups and downs," Sallee added. "But for the most part, I enjoy it. I think it's been a good experience."

Gastelum was the first of the pair to join the military.

"I joined about three and a half years ago," she explained. "I joined because I wanted to do something new."

"I joined about a year later," added Sallee. "Kim talked me into joining the Marines because initially I was thinking of going to the Air Force. I'm glad she talked me out of that."

The two sisters have always had a close relationship.

"We were both in choir and band together when we were kids," Sallee said. "We would even fool our grade school teachers into thinking we were the other sister."

Even when deployed, the sisters can't seem to avoid being mistaken for one another

"When we first moved into our new office, Kimberley came here to install the phone wiring for us, but I mistook her for Ashley," said 1st Sgt. Matthew J. Grither, first sergeant for Task Force Belleau Wood's Headquarters and Service Company. "Even after she explained to me who she was I was still skeptical. I had to call over to her shop to verify who she was."

The sisters have used their bond to overcome the hardships and deal with deployed life.

"She's a good emotional outlet," said Sallee. "She lets me vent about things that are troubling me. It's like when we're home together."

"She's definitely helped me deal with my homesickness," said Gastelum. "I'm really glad that she's here. It wouldn't be the same without her."

Chapter Tool Kit: Area Director Reports Useful

Area Directors and chapter officers, WMA needs your help. Each quarter the WMA Membership Secretary forwards the Quarterly Area Director Report to the Area Directors. The Area Directors need to forward that report to the respective chapters; a chapter officer needs to review the report. It will identify the members in each chapter, with their address, national membership status, and (if appropriate) life membership number. Verify the national address and chapter address are correct; review the national and chapter dues status. Are the dues current? Is there a discrepancy? Any noted corrections need to be forwarded to the Area Director, who will forward them to the Membership Secretary. When the next report comes in, verify the corrections have been made. each report, the corrections should become minimal. This is also a good time

to review the next of kin information for the chapter member. If any corrections need to be made, forward them to the WMA Chaplain and Area Direction.

Your help will correct bad addresses and lapsed membership. We are still getting incorrect dues for renewal.

Your help with this will correct bad addresses and lapsed membership. We are still getting incorrect dues for renewal. The new national dues have been in place over one year, but incorrect amounts are still being submitted. Some members even submit old applications with the

wrong dues. WMA needs help from the chapter officers to resolve this issue. As a chapter officer, if you are not receiving the quarterly report, ask your Area Director for it.

The Area Director Report is a good op portunity to identify new WMA members in the area of your chapter. The contact information on the report can help generate new members for the chapter. Chapter members often ask how they can get new members. This is an excellent recruiting tool.


The Area Director Report is a win-win for everyone. It is a great way to keep both the chapters and National updated, but no one benefits if the reports are **not used**. Please help!



The Marine Corps Heritage Foundation has been expanding the National Museum of the Marine Corps. A key element of the expansion is the Semper Fidelis Memorial Park, a place for remembrance and reflection within which Marines, family members, and friends may honor those who served - and sacrificed - in our Corps.
