

Salute to The Women's Reserve Band / USA-1

On 13 July 1943, General Alexander A. Vandergrift published an order which directed that "a Marine Corps Women's Reserve Band is to be organized for duty at Camp Lejeune, New River, North Carolina." The order also stated that "It is the desire to make this the most outstanding female band of the country." With these orders in hand, Capt. William F. Santelmann, Director of the Marine Band, set out on what seemed like a mission impossible because building a strong and skilled band normally requires years of work, and he was only given a few months in which to accomplish this mission.

When word of this new band hit the press on 29 July 1943, talented female musicians from all across the nation rushed to the closest recruiting office to get a shot at being selected for this very unique military band. One of the critical requirements for each band member was that they had to complete basic recruit training before they could become members of the WR Band. This ensured that those who were not selected for the band could serve in other assignments.

One of the women who joined the Marine Corps specifically to have a chance to join this band was Bonnie Smallwood Medin, who had majored in music in college, but during WWII found herself teaching other subjects because there was such a great shortage of teachers. Bonnie wasn't a percussionist by training, but when that was what the band needed, Bonnie stepped up and learned how to play the snare drum. She also sang in the vocal trio and played drums in the dance band that performed as a subset of the full band.

By December 1943, the band gave their first performance, which was quite good, much to the surprise of many who thought they would need more time to practice. The band consisted of 48 memUSA-1 was very unique because its members were spread all across the United States and only women who had actually been WR Band members were eligible for membership.

bers and they gave a total of 543 performances over the next two years to include 172 concerts, 156 parades, 80 dances, 33 recruit trains, 32 guard mounts, 13 stage shows, 11 radio broadcasts, 1 telecast in Chicago, 3 tours and various other performances. They supported bond drives, visited the wounded in hospitals, and played on NBC Radio to celebrate the 1st Anniversary of the Womens Reserve on 13 February 1944.

In the two years they were together, the band became like family, and when WWII ended and almost all of the Wom-

en Reserves were discharged, the band voted to have Bonnie publish a newsletter to keep the band members informed and connected. Bonnie accepted this responsibility and has published a quarterly newsletter called The Quarter Note for the past 65 years. She has been the glue that has kept the 67 women who served in the band connected. On 7 August 1974, WMA President Ruth Broe issued a charter to the Women's Reserve Band Chapter and USA-1 has been represented in WMA for the past 36 years. The members of USA-1 were spread all across the United States and only women who had actually been WR Band members were eligible for membership. Sadly, most of the USA-1 members have passed or are unable to participate in chapter activities, so USA-1 had to disband in October 2010.

Bonnie never served as president of USA-1, but she performed all the duties required to keep the chapter active. She kept the band members informed and in touch, she organized regular reunions for WR Band members and she represented USA-1 at WMA conventions. Bonnie also made sure WR Band history was documented in a book she co-authored with Ellen Stone titled *Musical Women Marines: The Marine Corps Women's Reserve Band in World War II.*

The WR Band was unique because it was the only all female band that has ever existed in the Marine Corps. Because of the dedication of Bonnie Medin, WR Band members have remained a family of sisters for 65 years. We thank all of the WR Band members for their contribution to Women Marine history and we thank Bonnie Medin for making sure that history will always be remembered.

Once again, Women Marines Aid the Sixth Marine Division

As in 1943 when women were called upon to join the Corps to "Free A Man To Fight", taking over many non-combat billets, thus enabling the Sixth Marine Division to be in the field, so now come members of the Women Marines Association to take over transportation duties for The Sixth Marine Division 2010 Reunion. The Sixth Marine Division held their annual reunion October 10-14, 2010 at The Orleans in Las Vegas,

NV. The Women Marines Association's Battle Born (NV-1) Chapter stepped up to the plate to assist. The Battle Born women: Lisa Michael (chapter President), Rosemary Gregorec (chapter Treasurer) and member Annette Moser-Canos and Amy Kushneruk (representing the Marine Corps League Greater Detachment) collectively spent 5 days meeting the Marines, the widows and the families at the airport as each flight arrived.

They assisted with luggage and transportation to the reunion site at The Orleans Hotel and Casino. They also provided transportation to the outlet mall while still meeting arriving flights and members. In all the women of Battle Born greeted and transported approximately 92 of Marines and family in approximately 40 round trips for a total of 411 miles of driving.

"It was an amazing experience. I have been humbled and honored to have had

the opportunity to serve the Marines and their families of the Sixth!" said Rosemary Gregorec. She also said "These guys are amazing. Even at their advanced ages of 80 to 90 years old, I still had to fight them to let me carry their luggage. The fight was not because of their ages, but it was because they were gentlemen and they were not going to let a lady carry or lift a bag."

"I had at least three of them try to give me a tip" said Amy Kushneruk, a sentiment echoed by Lisa Michael who replied to each attempt "Your money is no good here."

All of them were very appreciative of the service provided by Battle Born. As Rosemary Gregorec was taking a group to the hotel, a Marine, his daughter and son-in-law, the son-in-law commented on how great this was that she would be doing this. Rosemary replied "It's what Marines do; we take care of each other."

More of Our History

Command Visit

Joanie Schwartz-Wetter from the staff of the MCRD San Diego Command Museum spent a day touring the Women of the Corps Collection, and reviewing our data base and systems that we have in place. Sara Phoenix and I hosted Joanie and presented the Collection from our uniforms section through our document collections. Joanie expressed her awe for all we have accomplished and our plans for the future. The MCRD San Diego Command Museum has a collection within the Women of the Corps Collection. It was started a couple of years ago when Museum Director and WMA member Barbara McCurtis sent us some surplus uniforms she thought might be helpful to the Women of the Corps Collection. Having Joanie visit was the highlight of the year for the Collection staff.

Stumbling on Our History

Some of you may know that the www. womenmarines.org site gets inquiries from families and friends of former Marines. Many are trying to locate the stories of the Marines they know. I receive the inquiries that relate to history from Karen Kelly who monitors the site for WMA.

Just before Christmas, we received an inquiry from Lois Barry in Montana, a WWII Marine who has few individuals to share her memories involving her life as a Marine. I contacted her over the holidays and what a fantastic call. We talked 90 minutes and said our goodbyes with sides sore from laughing and dry throats from talking. I stumbled on this fascinating history that might have been lost by not making this call.

Lois Barry joined the Marines and was in the first class at Hunter College. Lois boarded a troop train in California and ended up in New York City a full week later. Lois even has her train ticket stub, the only one I know of in existence.

Lois remembers her Hunter Platoon Commander Lieutenant Cook, who wore the uniform of a Navy Ensign, since Lt. Cook while a Marine Officer did not have her Marine uniform, as yet. Known as Cookie by her Marines, Lt. Cook was one of the 19 Navy Officer Candidates who opted to become Marine Officers with the rank of First Lieutenant at the request of the Commandant the day before they were to be commissioned

into the Navy. They became the instructors/platoon commanders for the first women Marine recruits at Hunter, while the remainder became our first women recruiters. The story of these nineteen women has been known for years. We even had a photo of some of them as a group, but no one has known their names or anything about them as individuals.

In mid 2010 while opening a incoming collection that had come to the Women of the Corps Collection, a set of orders containing all nineteen names, MOSs, first duty stations, and homes of record was found in the first envelope in the box that was opened. Now with the help of Lois Barry, we are learning more about one of these 19 Marines who have always been such a Marine mystery.

Lois, like many in her Hunter Class (perhaps 50 or so recruits) did not have uniforms by graduation and stood on the sidelines as the regiment of recruits (Navy and Marine) marched in their graduation parade. This first parade of the new Women Marines was covered by every major news and wire service. The graduating recruits who had not received uniforms were simply not allowed on the field.

Lois Barry became a recruiter based in MN, covering the states of MN, SD, ND, MT, WI and the Upper Peninsula of Michigan. She spent her entire time in the Corps (1943-1946) on recruiting duty. Lois has generously offered the Women of the Corps Collection (WOTC) access to her photo albums, news photos of recruits and news articles for scanning. Please contact me at (303) 663-3747 or niwilt @aol.com if you were a WWII recruiter and would like to contact Lois Barry and share stories with her.

Another www.womenmarines.org contact has been made with a male Marine who has just received a female bulldog puppy that he named Opha after our WWI Opha Mae Johnson. After passing on answers to all his questions, plus much more info on Opha, he asked a final question that I could not answer: "Where is Opha Mae Johnson buried?" If any of you know the answer,





Golda's Story: Adventures of a Woman Marine in WW II

A MOMENTOUS DAY IN HISTORY, December 7, 1941, changed the lives of many people including myself. On March 2, 1944, in Seattle, Washington, I enlisted in the United States Marine Corps and left for boot camp on

April 28th, 1944. Boot camp was at Camp Lejeune, N.C where I was in Co. E, Plat 4, 32nd Bn, USMCWR. Prior to enlistment I was a lead girl in the payroll department at Boeing Aircraft Co. I felt I wasn't doing enough to help the war effort in my job and since I had a brother in the Army, I wanted to help get the war over before he got killed or wounded.

Realistically, I think I was also bored with my job. I have always loved uniforms (my first real crush was on a Boy Scout!), and since I have always been competitive, if I was going in the service I wanted to go into the one that had the highest requirements and was the most difficult to get into. The Marine Corps seemed to fit that bill. My mother, being an adventurous soul like myself, thought it was a great idea, but my father refused to give his consent, which I needed because I was only 20 at the time. I blackmailed him by threatening to never speak to him again if he didn't sign, so he reluctantly gave his permission. My brother also was against my going in the service but said, "I don't like the idea of your going in the service, but as long as you are determined, I am glad it is the Marine Corps you are joining." Incidentally, he was a lst Lt. in the Field Artillery, was in the Battle of the Bulge and came home unscathed. Thank God.

Prior to going in the Marine Corps, I had served as a USO Junior hostess and also belonged to a group of Boeing Aircraft Company employees who banded together to give variety shows at war centers in the Seattle area. I played guitar and sang. When I joined the Corps, I donated my guitar to the Navy Hospital.

Our boot camp training was not nearly as rigorous as that of the women Marines today, but for someone who was never very athletic and had been working at a desk job for two years, it was pretty formidable. The first week I thought I was going to die and the second week I was hoping I would. Our boot camp was filled with classes on military protocol,

military history, history of the Marine Corps, close order drill and physical endurance training. The gas chamber drill was the worst experience and all of us remember that one vividly.

Throughout it all, it was emphasized that we would be Lady Marines and would do nothing to disgrace the uni-

form of a United States Marine. After boot camp I was given the assignment from Hell-two weeks of mess duty! I was washing trays from first mess in the morning until last mess in the evening, then the whole mess hall had to be cleaned up for the next day. The weather at Camp Lejeune that time of year is anything but balmy. Where I was working, over large stationery sinks, the temperature sometimes got up well over one hundred de-

> grees. If we managed to finish the dishes before the next mess. we would be given a break and we would lie down on the cement floor for a brief nap, as that was the coolest place in the whole building. There was no air conditioning or fans in those days in the buildings. We had to walk a mile from our barracks to the chow hall and back again, late in the evening, when we were dead tired from working all day. I lost ten pounds in that two weeks.

After my two week stint on mess duty, I was assigned to US Marine Corps Base in San Diego, Calif. where I went to Sound Motion Picture Technician's School at US NAVTRACEN on the Navy base which was adjacent to the Marine Corps Base. There were

ten of us WRs, two WAVES and one SPAR training with one male Marine and twenty-four sailors. There we learned to operate the 35 MM projectors used in theatres, 16 MM projectors used for training film, set up sound systems and repair and maintain all of the equipment.

We were constantly being told by our superiors that in order to be accepted by the men we had to be twice as good as they were in our jobs, so we studied very hard and most of us exceeded the men in our grades.

WHEN WE HAD COMPLETED THE COURSE, the officer in charge told us that we all were competent enough to work in any theatre in the U.S. except, he added, "You women would never be hired because it is considered a man's job."

We were constantly being told by our superiors that in order to be accepted by the men we had to be twice as good as they were in our jobs, so we studied very hard and most of us exceeded the men in our grades. Toward the end of the war, one of the generals, who had been the most outspoken against having women in the service, was reputed to have said, "Send me one woman to work and I can let two men go fight."

I graduated from SMPTS on September 15 and was placed on standby while waiting for further orders. Since the Marine Corps is not an organization that lets its members sit around idle, we were given various chores such as scrubbing out garbage cans, cleaning the area, moving linens from the downstairs linen closet to the upstairs and the next day reversing the procedure, and various other chores.

My orders eventually arrived and I was assigned to the United States Marine Corps Air Depot at Miramar, CA. There were three of us from the school sent there and upon our arrival we found that the SMPT duties were already filled so I was assigned to the directory service in the base post office which is where I worked until I was discharged on Nov. 23, 1945.

At that time, the base at Miramar was

not an airfield like it is now. It was the processing point for all Marine Corps Air personnel going to the South Pacific and coming back to the states for reassignment. Consequently, there was a constant flow of mail going both ways, which had to be re-addressed to reach the recipient. Since the mail was the life blood and morale booster of the men overseas, it was very important that they get their mail as rapidly as possible. I started in the post office re-addressing mail but was soon promoted to "Change Sheets." There were five or six of us girls on that duty and we received all of the company rosters (called "change sheets" because they reflected all of the changes within the company, ie: killed, missing in action, wounded and sent to a hospital or home, transferred to other duty stations, punishments, etc.) Very interesting, but heartbreaking as in the case of the bombing of the carrier USS Franklin, when we lost hundreds of Marines on that one ship. The "killed in action" bags mounted up, but we weren't allowed to send the mail back until the Franklin made it back into port, as they didn't want the Japanese to know that they had not sunk it.

Every day we had to face a growing pile of "killed in action" mail when we came to work. Even now, it hurts my heart to talk of it.

Our job was to take the change sheets and make the changes on the IBM card the girls had in their files. All of this was done manually in those days so around the holidays, when we were flooded with returned mail and packages, we sometimes worked 15 hour days and sometimes 7 days a week...and no overtime pay! There were two squadrons of women Marines at Miramar, AWRS-4 and AWRS-5, and we alternated on having the duty on weekends. If you had the duty that meant you couldn't leave the base and had to work half days on Saturday. There were about 500 women Marines stationed there at the height of the war.

Since Miramar was a staging area for all Marine Air personnel going overseas and coming home, we had a lot of revues to stand when the men came back and farewell dances when there was a new group going over. I loved to march and would often stand in for one of the girls if she had a date and could get a liberty pass.

San Diego was sixteen miles from Miramar and the base ran a "cattle wagon" to transport Marines to and from there. This was a semi trailer with seats along the sides, which made for a rather rough ride when the driver was in a hurry to get there.

Most of us preferred to hitch a ride at a shelter outside the gate, which was termed a waiting station. It had painted in large letters on the side "Give 'em a lift" and many people did. In San Diego, we went to movies, danced to name bands at Pacific Square, a large dance hall, and frequented the many bars. The town seemed to be populated mainly by Marines, sailors and soldiers with the *(Continued)*

civilians just there to take care of their needs such as food and entertainment. If we had an overnight pass, we would usually go to an all night movie to spend the night as the USO was not equipped for women to stay there. When on the base, in our leisure hours we attended the base theatre or went to the "slop shop" where they served beer and sodas and there was juke box music to dance to. As I mentioned before, we had frequent base dances and sometimes they would run a bus to take us to dances at Camp Pendleton and Camp Elliott. Since I liked to dance, I was frequently on those buses.

At one of the trips to Camp Pendleton I met John Basilone, Medal of Honor recipient, who was on his was back to the Pacific where he was killed at Iwo Jima.

When I was stationed in San Diego I tried out for and made the drill team. We practiced many hours on the parade grounds, always in the evening when all of the rest of the activities were over. At one time we performed at the Balboa Stadium when the East-West units of the Redskins played their annual Shrine benefit game. The San Diego newspaper said, "Between halves the MCB band will play and a crack 40-unit WR drill team under the direction of Lt. Emily Schultz will perform." What never made the news was that we did not perform to the satisfaction of Lt. Schultz and when the game was over we got in the bus, went directly to the parade grounds and marched until dark. No chow, no break. From then on we were perfect.

At Miramar, they formed a women's pistol team with the idea that the other bases would also form teams and we would have competition. Since we had to be on the range at 4 a.m. on Sunday morning and the male Marines, who were our instructors, were not very happy about having to coach women Marines, that idea did not get very far. I was disappointed as I was a pretty good shot and was looking forward to being in competition.

In July, 1945, while swimming at the base pool, I dived from the 3 meter board, hit the water wrong, and broke my right arm. I was in sick bay from then until after the war ended. Even in sick bay, I was not allowed to sit around and feel sorry for myself. I had "the head" duty which meant I had to keep the rest rooms for the women's area clean. I was in sick bay from then until after the war ended.

Even in sick bay, I was not allowed to sit around and feel sorry for myself. I had "the head" duty which meant I had to keep the rest rooms for the women's area clean. I told the Navy nurse I had a broken right arm and her reply was, "You've got a good left arm so you are in charge of the head."

When I wasn't polishing mirrors and cleaning toilets they gave me capsules to fill with a medical powder and bandages to roll.

When I ran out of work, I did a lot of reading. When the war was finally over, one of the nurses brought in a bottle of liquor and two other girls, who were patients also, and myself got gloriously drunk. When I got out of sick bay, I had some leave time coming, so I went to Georgia to visit a 1st Division Marine I had met when I was stationed at the Marine Corps Base in San Diego and whom I had kept up a correspondence with. A week after I got there we got married.

The following week I reported back to Miramar and put in for a discharge. I received my honorable discharge on November 23, 1945 and, after a brief visit home to Oregon and Washington, I returned to my husband in Georgia.

I was promoted to the rank of PFC on September 13, 1945 and my pay at the time of my discharge was \$54 a month. I was given \$143.02 travel allowance to return home and a mustering out pay of \$100.00. I en-

Marine recounts time with female engagement team

To quote the Rolling Stones, "Cool, calm and collected," that's the impression Lance Cpl. Sorina Langer, base operations flight clearance clerk, gives off when talking to her. Who would guess, listening to her soft voice and watching her movements, that she was a previous member of a Female Engagement Team?

Langer, a 21-year-old native of River Falls, Wis., returned to the states Oct. 14, 2010, and came back to the air station Dec. 4, 2010, after an eight-month deployment to Marjah in Helmand Province, Afghanistan, in support of operations there.

The FET is a milestone in United States Armed Forces history, as it has integrated females into infantry units, and for the first time combat the enemy. While females in the field are not new, the Lioness Program, which has females posted at key checkpoints in Iraq and Afghanistan, could be seen as the FET's precursor-the FET expands a woman's role in country.


"The key difference (between the FET and Lioness Program) is we're more engaged with the locals, and not as much searching," said Langer. "We're there to create rapport with the locals and our male Marines."

In a war where psychological operations are seen as an essential component in victory, and dealing with a patriarchal culture presents major challenges, FETs are an indispensable asset to any ground unit.

"When you see a group of male Marines they're usually there for one purpose, and they can be very intimidating," said Langer. "We go in there to soften up the relationship."

While some male and even female Marines might scoff at the idea of women in a combat-heavy environment, Langer said she encountered more problems with the locals than she did with 1st and 2nd Battalions, 6th Marine Regiment, whom she worked with.

"We knew what to do, and how to do it. The Marines didn't feel like they had to protect themselves and us," said Langer, whereas the male locals would hit the female Marines, spit on them and make

sexual slurs, translated by a linguist.

"The male Marines knew they needed us, and they knew that everyone on the FET volunteered for it," said Langer.

Langer, nicknamed "Lil' Mama" by her peers, did not let her gender interfere with her duties.

"Everything they wore, we wore. We went on patrols, clearing operations and missions. We didn't know what to expect," said Langer.

Langer didn't just experience the physicality of field life, she also encountered its many dangers.

Improvised explosive devices, firefights and snipers were common at Combat Outpost Azaidi and during patrols, a colossal change from organizing flight schedules at the air station.

"I was blown up," said Langer, shrugging. "I have two grazes on my neck. There were times where we were in firefights and you can hear the rounds whizz past your face. It's scary, it really is."

For her actions, Langer earned the Combat Action Ribbon. However, other struggles besides life and death existed in her world.

"By the end of my deployment, we were able to start a school," said Langer, who also worked with civil affairs operators in the region.

At first, the teachers were being threatened and Afghan women were frightened to come out. To top it off, the school was held inside a tent. But the Marines' efforts ultimately paid off. Soon, the teachers were no longer being threatened. As for the school attendance, "half of them were females."

"Last I checked with 2/6, they actually built a school building," said Langer with a smile.

Carrying with her memories of a combat tour, an experience that few female Marines possess, Langer said she would like to continue being involved in the FET.

They want FET Marines to train newcomers, said Langer, who is hoping for another deployment.

"I think that females in the military need to step up, to stop using the fact they're females as an excuse," said Langer. "They need to take pride in their uniform, in their job title."

After all was said and done, Langer revealed she had only one regret.

"I would've worked harder to extend my time there," she said. "The hardest thing about deployment is not leaving your family, leaving your friends, it's leaving the Marines out there, going back to the states and knowing they're still there."

Hello to all Loyal Escorts.

In this, my first column of the new year, I would like to recap 2010, which I believe was an outstanding year for our organization. The high points were:

(I) Loyal Escorts converted from a 501(c)(19) Veterans Organization to a 501(c)(3) Charitable Organization. This change allows dues and donations to the Loyal Escorts to be considered tax-deductible contributions. The change also removed the degree-of-kinship membership restriction, which opened our membership to anyone who is sponsored by a WMA member.

(II) We had a very successful support effort at the 2010 WMA Convention in Denver. I detailed our efforts in the last newsletter, but I wanted to mention it here in the yearly highlights.

(III) We had what I consider an exceptional recruiting year. In 2010, we had 46 individuals join as new members. Eighteen of our new members joined as life members, twenty-eight joined as term members, and three former term members converted to life membership.

A new feature that I plan to incorporate in my quarterly column in 'Nouncements is a listing of new members. In this first report, I am listing those who joined at or since the convention in Denver.

As of December 31, 2010, our current membership is 284, comprised of 66 term members and 218 life members.

As our membership grows and our recruiting efforts evolve, we are taking steps to recognize Loyal Escorts who help us grow. As you may know, we currently recognize the WMA chapter that recruits the most new Loyal Escort members, but we have no system for recognizing Loyal Escorts who recruited new members. We are working to change that!

Chapter Tool Kit: Keep Membership Records Current

As we kick off our new year, each Women Marines Association chapter has obligations to fulfill in the first quarter. Keeping our chapters in the good graces of the Internal Revenue Service is critical. I can't emphasize too much, how important it is for chapters to comply with the IRS. The WMA Treasurer, Betty Moseley Brown, will provide IRS guidelines to each of the chapters; contact Betty if there are any questions relating to chapter tax status.

Also during the first quarter, each chapter should prepare a roster of their officers with contact information, including name, address, email, phone number, office position and chapter dues status. Along with the officer roster, a roster of chapter members with addresses is requested. These two rosters should be sent

to the 1st VP, Judy Anderson, Membership Secretary, Debra Drummond, and the Area Director. Our chapters and organization are constantly changing; that usually means people are moving...going and coming; death and illness. One of the biggest challenges to the WMA Membership Secretary is keeping membership records updated. The quarterly Area Director Report is provided to each Area Director identifying the chapters with members and all the area MALs. The goal is each area director will provide the report to the chapters. The chapters should verify the chapter members and contact information and return any corrections to the Area Director. When the Area Director receives these reports. they should be forwarded to the Membership Secretary for corrections. It is

hoped that reconciling these reports quarterly will keep the membership records current.

Providing the rosters during the first quarter is just another way to ensure chapter membership information is current.

Things to do in the first quarter for WMA chapters:

1. Provide roster of chapter officers to WMA 1st VP, Membership Secretary and Area Director.

2. Send roster of chapter membership to 1st VP, Membership Secretary, and Area Director.

3. Maintain chapter membership files with dues paid status.

4. File the annual IRS 990-N, also known as the e-postcard.






