



Even though we are all volunteers we recognize that WMA is an established 501(c) (3) non-profit organization that requires a never-ending dedication to duty. Conducting the business of WMA is a responsibility not taken lightly by the BOD, and we have been hard at work these last several months to do just that.

2019 has become a very busy year in Area 1 with many new stories to share! The top story is we recently accomplished our mission of officially chartering and naming three new chapters after our three fallen KIA sister Marines from our Area: RI-2 Cpl Holly Charette Chapter, NY-6 Cpl Ramona Valdez Chapter,



and the newest is MA-3 Captain Jennifer Harris Chapter.

TX-7 Opha May Johnson Chapter surprised us with a donation of a hand-made memorial wreath to be shared amongst our fallen sisters in Area 1 which will rotate between the chapters. The first stop was during Memorial Weekend at Cpl Holly Charette's graveside.

We've started five new chapters since 2018 with some great leaders at the helm, for a total of seven in Area 1. It's been quite challenging to get some traction with the new chapters in their respective regions, but these Marines are committed to their mission. All of them admit that the struggles were rooted in the communities not being familiar with the WMA, as well as other veteran organizations not knowing us. (Area 1 does not have any major military installations.) However, what they have learned, is these communities are very welcoming to Marines and want to help once they are acquainted with our goals and mission as female Marines. Being visible and relevant to today's needs for female veterans is truly what attracts others to our mission.

Some of our recent highlights from our members are from NY-7 Long Island Chapter with Korean War veteran Evelyn Kandal being honored by the organization "Heroes Among Us" as a woman veteran of the Korean War. Evelyn is also a poet laureate. Additionally, from NY-7, three chapter members, StaceyAnn Castro Tapler, Christine Glynn, and Magdolna Resker are on the newly formed Women Veterans Advisory Board for Suffolk County (Long Island, NY) with State Legislator Susan Berland. 11 board members will be from all military service branches. From NY-6 we recognize Janelle Marina Mendez who has spearheaded the new organization "Military Sexual Trauma Movement." The MST Movement was selected to attend the 2020 Presidential Conference in July. Janelle was selected as one of the movement leaders making waves in national politics and given a scholarship to attend. I'm sure we'll be hearing more about Janelle going forward!

It's been exciting for all of us to experience the new energy and esprit de corps in Area 1. We are looking forward to starting up a new chapter in Maine with the fearless leader Yvonne Devine. We still have interest in New Hampshire to start a new chapter, and hopefully honor Marine Ashley Guindon who was formerly from Merrimack, NH. Ashley served six years in the Corps and later became a police officer with the Prince William County, VA Police Department. Sadly, she was killed in the line of duty in February 2016.

Area 10 has installed a new chapter in northern California, CA-16, with President Cheryle Anderson-Jones. They will be recruiting in the area, look for the flyers.




Each year the Foundation presents a series of awards for creative works preserving or advancing Marine Corps history, traditions, culture, or service. Marines and civilians are eligible to submit their own artistic entries or the distinguished work of others. The below awards were presented at the Foundation's Annual Award ceremony on April 27, 2019.

This year's recipient of the Julia Hamblet Award went to British writer Jim Moran for his book, "They are Marines – The USMCWR in the Second World War, a description of uniforms, history and traditions of 23,000 Women Reservists who served during WWII."

Born in 1954 in Sheffield, England, Jim has been a student of the history of the United States Marine Corps, massing a huge collection over the past forty years. He has assisted Hollywood

productions on uniform and equipment details for "Flags of our Fathers," "The Pacific" (HBO mini-series), and "Windtalkers." He has written extensively on the uniforms, equipment, and history of the United States Marine Corps. Along with collecting memorabilia, he accompanies USMC veterans on trips to the battlefields of WWII.

Named for the longest serving Director of Women Marines, this award is funded by a bequest from the estate of Lotus Mort and judged by the Women Marines Association. It is given to the individual or team who has done the most to further the recognition of the history of women who have earned the title Marine.



Maj McClung was the first female Marine Corps officer killed in combat. During the Iraq War, she was serving as a public affairs officer in Al Anbar Province, Iraq when she was killed by an IED. She was also

the first female graduate of the United States Naval Academy to be killed in action since the school was founded in 1845.



The Women Marines Association (WMA) is pleased to announce a change in membership that now includes Fleet Marine Force (FMF) U.S. Naval women into their ranks

The criteria for Navy FMF membership in the WMA is simply that the sailor must provide documentation of earning the Fleet Marine Force pin/badge. This documentation (validated on DD 214) must accompany the WMA membership form and required dues for membership.

The Fleet Marine Force Warfare Insignia, also known as the FMF badge or pin is the insignia which is issued to those U.S. Navy officers and sailors who are trained and qualified to perform duties in support of the United States Marine Corps. These sailors have successfully completed the necessary requirements of the Fleet Marine Force Warfare Specialist Program. The FMF pin represents a rite of passage endured and a sacrifice made by the individual wearing it, and it signifies that the individual is an "FMF sailor." To earn the pin, a sailor is required to learn Marine Corps history, how a Marine unit operates and what it takes to be a Marine mentally and physically. This includes serving one year with a Marine Corps unit (two years for reserves), passing the Marine Physical Fitness Test, a written test, demonstrating skills used in service with the Marines such as weapon breakdown and familiarization, land navigation, and combat communications.

FMF sailors (active duty and veterans) add value to any veteran organization and will contribute to the WMA mission of promoting the welfare and well-being of elderly, disabled, and needy women Marines in the communities throughout the world. The WMA fosters the spirit of camaraderie of women who have served our country with a special focus on today's female veterans transitioning back home.

The WMA was organized in 1960, just 12 years after Congress passed the Women's Armed Forces Integration Act in 1948, which authorized women in the regular component of the Corps. At the time, women could not constitute over two percent of the total force with limited MOS fields and duty stations and could not hold permanent rank above lieutenant colonel. Today, women are fully integrated in the Corps with nearly nine percent of the total force and all MOS fields are open to every Marine with no limits to rank; and their sister FMF sailors are an integral member of every Marine Corps unit.



Congress Takes 1st Step in Forcing Marines to Make Boot Camp Coed

The commandant of the Marine Corps will have five years to stop separating men and women at the service's oldest boot camp, if a new amendment added to the 2020 defense authorization bill survives to ratification.

Rep. Jackie Speier, a California Democrat and chair of the House Armed Services Military Personnel subcommittee, proposed the amendment on Wednesday, which would prohibit gender-segregated training at the Marine Corps recruit

"Training at the Marine Corps Recruit Depot, Parris Island, SC, may not be segregated based on gender," the measure states. "The Commandant of the Marine Corps shall carry out this subsection not later than five years after the date of the enactment of this Act."

All female Marine recruits currently complete their entry-level training at Parris Island. No women attend the Marine Corps' West Coast training depot for new enlistees. Speier wants that to change, too. The commandant would have eight years to make training fully coed, the proposal states.

The measure was passed by the House Armed Services Committee by a vote of 31 to 26. Next it must be approved by the full House before moving onto the Senate, where it could face opposition from the Republican majority.

Almost every operational role and training course in the military is gender integrated, with the exception of Marine

Corps boot camp, Speier said as she introduced the measure.

"Fully integrating women is not only the right thing to do, it makes our military stronger," she said. "The women Marines serving in recently opened combat positions that I have met are immeasurably brave, tough, and inspiring. Each of them have had to prove themselves, over and over again, to male peers and superiors."

That problem can be solved, she said, by having all recruits train together at the start of their Marine Corps careers, regardless of gender.

"If platoons are transformational units, women should be in them," Speier added. "Having men and women work together from day one shows that they are all Marines."

Teresa Ovalle, a spokeswoman for Marine Corps Combat Development Command, which oversees the service's recruit training battalion, said Speier's amendment was "new information."

"We'll know more once this information has worked its way through appropriate channels," she said.

This is not the first time the Marine Corps has been told it needs to make its entry-level training fully gender integrated. In 2016, former Navy Secretary Ray Mabus gave the Marine Corps two weeks to submit a plan for coed boot

Ultimately, Mabus allowed the Marine Corps to find ways to further integrate training at boot camp. And it has, Commandant Gen. Robert Neller told Military.com last month.

Male and female recruits spend 65% of boot camp training together, Neller said. That includes time at the rifle range, in the field and in the squad bay.

"I think this idea that we're trying to disadvantage women is inaccurate," Neller said. "I think what we're trying to do is give all recruits every advantage to have the best opportunity to earn the title of Marine."

A Longstanding Debate

The Marine Corps has been pushed toward ending its long-held tradition of separating male and female recruits at entry-level training for years. That has been the case as leaders have grappled with ending mistreatment toward women, stamping out sexual assault, and opening all ground combat specialties to female Marines despite requests for

In 2015, LtCol Kate Germano, the officer overseeing the Marine Corps' female recruit battalion, was fired after she said she pushed for better training for women. Marine officials said she was relieved because she was a toxic leader. Germano's case, and later a book she cowrote with longtime military reporter Kelly Kennedy, offered a glimpse into what she said were uneven training standards at Parris Island.

This year, the Marine Corps' first-ever coed company graduated from Parris Island. The Marines trained with the typically all-male 3rd Recruit Training Battalion's India Company. The company included five male platoons and one female platoon. The recruits lived in different squad bays, but otherwise completed much of their training together. And in some cases, Neller said they performed better than all-male companies.

That's often the case for companies training at Parris Island, said Capt Bryan McDonnell, a spokesman for the recruit depot. But the differences typically aren't significant since drill instructors always follow the same training model, he said.

[India Company] scored higher than the [overall Recruit Training Regiment] average in marksmanship," he said, "but lower ... in water survival training."

McDonnell stressed that the evaluations can help officials adjust training when required, but they "are not, and should not be, used to assess the 'success' or 'failure' of a training company."

"Within a company, and within each platoon, Depot training staff ensure that all Marines graduating recruit training meet the rigorous standards for a basically qualified Marine," he added.

LtGen David Berger, who will soon replace Neller as the Marine Corps' commandant, told lawmakers during his confirmation hearing that having the men and women train together at Parris Island "went great."

"We have to look at this for perhaps next year, Berger said. "... I think it's a discussion ... the Marine Corps will have."




