New Blues

A company of female Marines made history on November 16, 2018 after becoming the first group of new Marines to debut the Corps' latest dress uniform.

The approximately 129 Marines of November Company were the first on the depot to graduate recruit training in the new version of the female blue dress coat.

The new coat features the iconic mandarin collar, white belt, and gold waist plate seen on male Marine uniforms.

Mary Boyt, a member of the Marine Corps Uniform Board, said plans to introduce the coat began in 2013 when then-Secretary of the Navy Ray Mabus instructed the Navy and Marine Corps to come up with ways to streamline uniforms and make them more unisex where possible. During a survey process, Boyt added many female Marines expressed that their current uniform wasn't being recognized as belonging to the Marine Corps as civilians were more familiar with the more common male version of the coat.

"This has been an issue that has come up to the uniform board several times in the past," said Boyt. "Female Marines have asked for the ability to wear the male uniform or something similar to the male uniform. We knew what the male uniform looked like, and we wanted to develop a female uniform that was similar to the males but met the unique design challenges of the female shape. So, we didn't want to just throw a male coat on them and say this is it."

For many drill instructors with November Company, the graduation was their first time publicly debuting their new blue dress coat. Many said the new uniform aligned them more with their male counterparts.

"Its very form fitting...it fits pretty well," said November Company DI Sgt. Jazmin Penado. "Now that we're wearing the same uniform as male Marines, I feel like we are all equal. I know that's what the Marine Corps is striving for, to make everything the same. I personally love the uniform."

November Company Drill Instructor SSgt. Kara Sykes, who serves as unit historian for 4th RTB, said the new uniform is a throwback to older female uniforms dating back to the World War II-era and is a return to form for the Marines; especially in light of the recent centennial marking 100 years of women serving in the Marine Corps.

"If you look back at history, when females first came into the Marine Corps, we had the high coats with the high neck collars and then we changed over the years to a different coat," she said. "The coat we have now is similar to when we first started. We're bringing it back. It's a good time for us to actually wear the coat... to see the history, to see how far we've come and to come back to history."

The new coat will gradually replace the current coat over the next several years and will become a mandatory uniform item in October 2022, at which time the current coat will become obsolete.

Last August, recruits with Papa Company, 4th RTB became the first recruits to be issued the new coat; however, they did not graduate in the coat as it is only worn for graduation in winter months.



Honor, Courage, Commitment in the WMA

In keeping with the highest traditions of the Marine Corps, Area 1 has embraced the mission of honoring our fallen sister Marines.

When I accepted the duty of AD1, there were only two remaining chapters out of the original ten chapters. I had been a member-



at-large from 2006-2016 and knew nothing about chapters or how they worked. I was told that my biggest task was recruitment of new members for this area, which includes all of New York state and all the New England states. So, I strapped my boots back on after 17 years being retired and started looking for Marines. Area 1's geography is the smallest of the ten areas in WMA; however, it's one of the highly populated areas in WMA with nearly 40 million people in just the major cities. This demographic research guided me in where my main targets would be to find Marines.

Coincidentally after becoming the Area 1 Director in 2016, I learned that one of our fallen sister Marines was from my area. I knew I had to find a

way to reach out to her Gold Star family, which meant I had to do some research about them, too. In the process of this research, I discovered that there were actually three Marines KIA from Area 1, not just the one. It became very clear to me that I needed to find a way to honor_my fallen sisters; which would be to simply name new chapters after them to carry on their legacy. But before I could officially do this, I needed permission from their families.

This is where it took courage for me to reach out to the Gold Star families. I don't think anyone really knows what to say to these amazing families, but the right words ended up flowing forward with a promise to honor our fallen sisters while embracing their Gold Star families, who are now our families. In 2018, the WMA chartered the RI-2 Cpl Holly Charette Chapter and the NY-6 Cpl Ramona Valdez Chapter. Holly and Ramona were killed in the same IED explosion in Fallujah in June 2005. Because of our commitment to honor them, their Gold Star families finally got to meet after 12 years and find a little bit of a healing bond in their grief. (For those who attended the national convention, you may remember meeting Holly's parents, Ed and Regina Roberts, who were thrilled to be welcomed as part of our family).

I continued my commitment to locating Capt Jennifer Harris's family. Jennifer was KIA in February 2007 in Iraq and was from Swampscott, MA. It took a while, but I finally found a contact. She was an only child and her mom passed away two years ago, which left just her father as next-of-kin. I wrote him a letter of introduction and a request to start up a chapter in his daughter's honor. He called me immediately after receiving the letter, and with tears of joy and sorrow all mixed together, he enthusiastically agreed. We are finalizing the paperwork now and will be requesting to charter the MA-3 Captain Jennifer Harris Chapter early this year. We already have five Marines committed to pushing this forward and we are seeking more Marines from the Boston region and from Marines who may have served with her. 

First female Marine graduates from Winter Mountain Leaders Course

Sgt Tara-Lyn Baker is the first female Marine to graduate from the Marine Corps' arduous and physically demanding Winter Mountain Leaders Course.

Sgt Baker, a heavy equipment mechanic, graduated January

8th from the nearly six-week school based out of the Marine Corps Mountain Warfare Training Center in Bridgeport, CA.

The course hones Marines' skills in cold weather survival, skiing, snow mobility and mountain war-

fare.

"You learn how to survive, you learn how to deal with the cold," Baker said in a video posted by the Marine Corps. Baker went on to say she suffered from frostbite and hypothermia.

"We learn how to overcome it," she said about dealing with the austere cold-weather environ-

ment of the mountains.

The Corps has been pushing to train the force in extreme cold-weather environments. The Marines recently doubled the size of their rotations to Norway to nearly 700 Marines in an effort to train more Marines in the harsh cold Arctic environment.

Integrated Training

For the first time in its history, the Marine Corps will *integrate* female and male platoons during boot camp.

Unlike the other services, the Marine Corps has not fully integrated women and men during re-

cruit training.

"On January 5, 2019, 3rd Recruit Training Battalion aboard MCRD Parris Island, will start their training cycle with one female platoon and five male platoons," the Marine Corps said in a statement Friday.

While the change is not permanent, a Marine Corps spokesman fold ABC News that the service "will certainly look at how the company performs in this model as we continually evaluate how we

make Marines."



The Marine Corps, which has the lowest percentage of women among the services at just under 9 percent, decided to incorporate the 50 female recruits into the historically all-male battalion because the recruiting classes are typically

much smaller in the winter months. The integration allowed Parris Island to not activate 4th Recruit Training Battalion staff for a single female platoon.

"The decision was made by Marine Corps leadership in support of training efficiency and is a first in the history of Marine Corps recruit training," the statement said.

The female recruits will still be led by female drill instructors, but will live in barracks co-inhabited by

their male counterparts.

"This training cycle of about 300 recruits will provide Recruit Depot staff a unique opportunity to assess outcomes, achievements and challenges in training, logistics, and resource impacts of this company training model," the Marine Corps said.

Despite segregated male and female battalions, the Marine Corps has been increasing the amount of training men and women do together – something ABC News saw firsthand during a visit

to Parris Island in February.

"The value of increasing the amount of integration that occurs between male and female recruits is that with increased exposure and socialization we address some of the attitudes that male recruits might have about female recruits and vice versa," LtCol Misty Posey, who leads 4th Battalion, told ABC News during that visit.

Posey didn't see gender segregation as a detriment, but praised the Corps' efforts to have more instances of men and women interacting in their training, beyond just merely operating side by side. Sixty percent of recruit training is now either gender-integrated or co-located, according to the Marine Corps.

Male and female recruits complete the Com-

bat Fitness Test exercises together: running side by side, facing each other while lifting the same 30-pound ammunition can over their heads, and sometimes even carrying one another on their backs. The genders are also integrated during the end of "The Crucible" – the 54-hour culminating event of training where recruits face physical, mental, and moral challenges with only eight hours of sleep over three days. They now hike the last nine miles of the event together.

The Marine Corps' West Coast recruit training in San Diego has not been opened to female recruits, something the Corps has said is due to the low number of women enlisting in the service.

WMA Matching Funds and Grants
Application Requirements

Each fiscal year, the WMA Matching Funds and Grants (MFG) Committee processes applications and administers the budget for both matching fund requests from WMA chapters and emergen-

cy fund requests from eligible individual veterans. The matching funds application form for chapters is provided in Appendix A of the WMA "How to Book," along with additional detail on acceptable expenses. Matching funds for chapters are limited to a maximum of \$250 per chapter, per fiscal year (1 July-30 June), and funds to be matched must be used to provide service, supplies, or equipment to support living military veterans. The term "matching" means that WMA matches the amount of money the chapter spends in support of veterans up to the limit of \$250 - e.g., in order to receive the maximum of \$250, the chapter must

spend \$500. Completed applications with sup-

A one time, per person, emergency funds grant of up to \$1,000 is available to assist veterans in need. The program is available to all veterans. Requests for an emergency grant should be submitted to **MFG@womenmarines.org**. The initial message should include a detailed explanation for the request, and include the amount being requested. By return email, the committee will send specific instructions on how to provide supporting documentation and independent verification of need and eligibility. Upon receipt of a complete emergency funds application, the committee will review the case and make a recommendation on funding.


All MFG applications are processed on a first-come, first-serve basis until the fiscal year's budget is exhausted.

Around the Services

The Navy has promoted Michelle Howard, making her the first female four-star admiral in its 236-year history.

Another woman has completed a major milestone in the F-35 Joint Strike Fighter. Maj. Rachael Winiecki, of the 461st

Flight Test Squadron, recently became the first female test pilot to lead an F-35 mission at Edwards Air Force Base, CA according to the service. Winiecki is part of a team overseeing developmental testing of all F-35 variants, which

began last month at the base. The service did not specify what type of flights Winiecki carried out at Edwards. She worked side-by-side with her crew chief, Airman 1st Class Heather Rice of the 412th Aircraft Maintenance Squadron, for the flight.

Capt. Dianna Wolfson, currently the operations officer at Norfólk Naval Shipyard in Virginia, was picked by Naval Sea Systems Command to take command of the Puget Sound Naval Shipyard. Wolfson will replace Capt. Howard Markle sometime later this year, though no exact date has been



released. Capt Wolfson holds masters' degrees from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology and brings a rich Navy experience: she served aboard aircraft carriers the USS George Washington from 1998 to 2001, and the USS Carl Vinson from 2007 to 2009. Born in Landstuhl, Germany, Wolfson graduated from the United States Merchant Marine Academy in 1996.



Able Seaman Kate Nesbitt, a medical assistant with the Royal Navy, receives the Military Cross from the Prince of Wales Buckingham Palace for sprinting through an Afghan war zone under heavy machine gun fire to keep an injured soldier from choking to death from a gunshot wound to the mouth. She cut a temporary airway and treated him for 45 minutes as rockets whizzed overhead and

bullets thudded into the ground nearby. She is the first woman to be invested with the Military Cross.

The soldier did survive.

What it Means to Me

Along with the photos of the Molly Marines, an information sheet and essay are also sent. I get these every time and seldom have room for the essays, but I'm going to try to include snippets from future essays in each issue (space allowing) from now on. When I read the below essay from PFC Alondra Perez, Platoon 4043, I thought you all should read it as well to see what this PFC went through before standing on the yellow footprints. PFC Perez graduated from recruit training on 2 November 2018. ~~ Editor

Being called "Molly Marine" is an unexplainable privilege. This recruit started from the bottom and made from the projects. Living in the ghetto, this recruit waited on every first day of the month to get food stamps because the boys and girls club

was not giving enough.

MOTIVATION – that is a big powerful word used in Recruit Training frequently; however, it has always been this recruit's theme throughout her life of struggle. This recruit's life has not been as fortunate as others because this recruit was broken her whole life. She did not fit in anywhere, and she often found herself abandoned by family members, teachers, and friends. This recruit's life felt small; it felt like living a horror movie. Being mentally and physically abused made it extremely difficult to be motivated. This recruit had to raise a three-year-old at the age of six. Even though this recruit had no idea how, it was her duty to protect and raise her little sister.

Sometimes what drives this recruit to wake up, is hearing, "LIGHTS LIGHTS LIGHTS" every morning. This recruit's motivation is also derived from receiving a letter a night before, being explained to her by her own mother that RCT Perez saved her life because ten years ago, her mother contemplated on committing suicide in a bathroom when this recruit was younger. This incident just about ended her life, and this recruit being eight years old banged on the door because "she was starving."

MOTIVATION is what drives someone to do or finish something. This recruit has been motivated since the day she had to sleep on the streets. This recruit has been motivated since her father left her because she was not good enough. This recruit has been motivated since she was bullied because of the clothes she had on and the way

she spoke.

Life has been giving this recruit motivation to strive for all types of greatness. This recruit keeps reminding herself why she pushes herself back up when pushing through an IT session. Every time this recruit's body shakes, she can feel its weakness leaving her body – weakness this life tried to give her. What is the point of being selfishness? Despite of the misery and agony this life has given to this recruit, this recruit is now more motivated than ever, and she has a lot of it to share with others. This recruit's sisters in the platoon 4043 need mo-

tivation as well, to do what they need to do every day. Every recruit has a reason to be here; every recruit wants to prove something. By giving that little "juice" every morning screaming "LET'S GO 4043," this recruit is hoping to push them a little further. It feels good to motivate others, telling them that they are going to make it. This recruit knows what it is like to feel horrible, sad, and miserable. Nobody should have to go through what this recruit went through.

This recruit motivates her sisters due to her past. The intentions were never for reorganization or show. It was more important for this recruit to remind them to focus on "Chow to chow" and "Sunday to Sunday." This recruit wanted to see motivation rushing through their veins. At the end of everything, there is no doubt that this recruit will scream at the top of her lungs, "WE MADE IT 43" because there always has to be that "juice" at the end. It is an honor and feels good when your sisters think that you deserve to be "Molly Marine." With the title or without, this recruit will always give her platoon all the efforts and motivation she has.

afterward serving in Motor Transport at Camp Lejeune and then Miramar until 1945 when she was honorably discharged.

You might not think much of that. After all, how many other women Marines went through the same thing? The fact that she joined the Marine Corps makes her a class act. But "treasure?" Let's see.



A little background first. After the war, she used her GI Bill and became a teacher in Iowa, then moved to Denver where she retired from teaching. Then she went to work for JC Penney and retired from that job. When she was younger, she built furniture for her home.

Marjorie Alexander was a founding member of the CO-1 chapter and of the Women of the Corps Collection. She provided a great deal of history and many artifacts to the collection. She attended almost every convention and helped in planning three, as well as participating in events to teach the Young Marines about women in the Marine Corps. Marge would always share her stories with them about what she did in the war whenever they attended an event. They were always enthralled with her stories.


NY-6 - Cpl Ramona Valdez

I served in the Marine Corps from 1977 to 1983. I've learned that things haven't changed much for female veterans. Just like the male veterans returning home with PTSD, MST, etc., female veterans have the same issues. When I was desperate, I was told by the VA Hospital that there were not enough female veterans in need of services. So where do I go to get the help I need as a female veteran?

In the last five years, I noticed the VA is trying to provide additional programs for female veterans, but this is still not enough and too late for many. The sad truth is that female veterans are falling through the cracks. Many female veterans live in their cars or couch-surf from home to home.

For me, I returned home from the Marine Corps 36 years ago with an 8-month old baby and I used my car as my house. Many of my family and friends who used to be my safety net were no longer around or able to help me. This past November, I unfortunately lost two close friends who came into my life at the worst time and they helped me find a new normal and get back on my feet again. In their memory, I decided to pass on what I had learned from them. I began looking for ways to help other female veterans who were homeless and needed encouragement or maybe just struggling with their transition back to civilian life.

With the help of the New York City Veterans Administration staff, who connected me with the staff of the NYC Department of Homeless Services, I was able to find 28 needy female veterans ranging from 30-68 years of age, as well as help six female veterans with 13 children between them. The children's ages ranged from infant to 17 years old.




