Coming soon...Election Ballot for the 2018-2020 Board of Directors

The nomination process is over and per Article Ten of our National Bylaws, a ballot will be prepared for those offices which received more than one nominee (considered "contested"), and will be mailed to the membership by 1 May. Envelopes returning voted ballots must be postmarked no later than 1 June. Area 1 WRs Receive WWII Victory Medal

On 9 February, eleven WWII women[®] Marines were recognized at the Connecticut Department of Veterans Affairs by Lt. Governor Nancy Wyman and Commissioner of Veterans Affairs, Thomas Saadi, in a ceremony for their service during WWII and to present them with the WWII Victory Medal which they never received. Colonel Adele Hodges, USMC (Retired), presented the medal.

The Women Marines Association partnered with the Marine Corps Heritage Foundation and the Marine Corps League, with the support of the Veterans Affairs Office, to organize this event and to celebrate these amazing Lady Leathernecks' sacrifice and service to our country.

On 13 February 1943 the Marine Corps made it official for women to enlist. Over 23,000 women flooded the Marine Corps recruiting offices with the goal to "Free a Man to Fight" and to help win the war. Their contract was for the duration of the war plus six months. The war



ended in September 1945. but the WWII Victory Medalwas not fully established until 1946. The medal was awarded to any -member of the U.S. military who served on active duty or bereserves tween 7 December 1941 and 31 Decem-

Thousands of women were rapidly discharged at the end of the war and sent home. Many married and moved away from their home of record, which caused a change of name and change of address to occur. Many of these women who served in WWII never knew they rated the WWII Victory Medal. Dorothy (Dottie) Dee, age 95, said, "I just wanted to serve my country and I hoped that the guy that I replaced made it home safely. He's the one who deserves this medal."

In addition to the WWII Victory Medal being awarded, Commissioner Saadi and Lt Governor Wyman presented each Marine the Connecticut Veterans Wartime Service Medal. U.S. Senator Chris Murphy, Secretary of State Denise Merrill, and U.S. Congresswoman Elizabeth Esty all joined in the celebration presenting proclamations to these WWII Marine Corps veterans.

Veronica (Ronnie) Bradley, Dorothy (Dottie) Dee, and Julia Lynch Slocum, all WWII veterans, were present and were honored at the ceremony. Additionally, four were honored who were not present due to health issues, (Thelma Dumont, Doris Stevensen, Helen Uziemblo, and Agnes Zdrojowy), and four more were honored posthumously (Gladys Dunbar, Rosaline Mucaria, Alice Rusch and Edna Juan-Welles). However, they were proudly represented with family members to receive the awards for them.

The day was a moving tribute to the Greatest Generation of warriors.

Committee Report Recommendations

The Review Committee Report concerning WMA processes, procedures and issues surrounding the resignations of numerous officers (some of which had nothing to do with the issues raised by others) in 2017 has been completed and distributed to the WMA Board. The focus of the reviewers was on ways to improve WMA. The report will be posted on the WMA Facebook page. The board is reviewing the recommendations and will vote on actions to be taken. NOTE that this was a REVIEW and not an INVESTIGATION. But all should know that during the process of asking questions for the review, additional information became available. Please be assured that no one in WMA has done anything illegal. Additionally, several people who were accused of wrong doing or incorrect behavior have been exonerated, to include Karen Kelly regarding the 800 number and both Jamie and Peter DePaola regarding payment of expenses that had been approved. Also, the Women of the Corps Collection has expanded significantly. It has been taken care of and is in good condition because of the stewardship of Ned and Nancy Wilt plus Sara Phoenix. As the report makes clear, some questions that were raised were legitimate and have led to actions taken/to be taken. If anyone is concerned about issues raised and not addressed here, please contact me.

Social media is fairly new and many organizations are struggling with how to address the new issues that arise through social media. There is room for improvement in WMA as an organization, as the Review Committee found. Actions to be taken will result in a better organization with better processes and rules to ensure that there will be defined and known ways to take care of any issues in the future.

In addition to the Review Committee's recommendations, I have several thoughts I'm proposing to the WMA Board of Directors. We definitely need to expand, and then disseminate our amplified rules for social media as it pertains to the WMA website and other sites. <u>WMA has</u> <u>no control over other websites and anyone can post</u> <u>anything they want on a website</u> if the admin of that site allows it. If WMA or an individual sees something posted that is inaccurate or worse, they can request the site take it down.

An applicable phrase I heard recently is: Remember I before E; Intelligence & Information before Emotion. We should all pause before we hit "send." Maybe even wait until the next day and read it again. Things written in the heat of emotion need time. Upon reflection, we may decide that even though we believe what we wrote to

be true, it should be said differently or not at all. One alternative is to try just venting to a friend (preferably by phone – digital messages have a way of getting out of hand). We are a professional organization of adults - and not just any adults, but adults who have earned the title Marine. Our actions are expected to meet a higher standard. And always do what is best for WMA. As an organization, WMA has done and can continue to do great things. The Review Committee report and recommendations will help WMA continue on the road to improvement.

Review Committee Recommendations

Based on Issues Presented by 3rdVP's Resignation Letter

Non-performance and manner of removal or request for resignation of an officer or director

 Instances of non-performance need to be addressed as soon as a problem is noted. WMA Board needs to review its bylaws and include policies and procedures to allow correction of non-performance including counseling, guidance, and opportunity to correct noted problem.

 WMA needs to modify and follow its bylaws when asking for the resignation of a Board member and clarify procedures when it becomes necessary to terminate an officer for non-performance of duties or other issue(s) that the Board determines is/are detrimental to the Association.

 Orientation for new Board members should be provided as soon as voted into a Board position and a refresher orientation provided for existing Board members. Part of the orientation should include WMA's expectations of its Board members (responding to emails, ballots, conference calls, etc.)

Nominee Review

 Credentials, background, and experience of WMA members who wish to serve on the Board should be reviewed before being nominated. Board expectations while serving as a Board director or officer need to be communicated to nominees prior to running for office and provide a statement of their understanding of expected duties once elected.

Communication and Transparency

 Communication with WMA members and transparency of Board activities needs to be made available to its members. IRS forms and audit reports may be offered for review to any member requesting this info. Contract with administrator needs to be reviewed and determine if admin contractor is in effect a contractor or an employee per Department of Labor regulations.

Directors and Officers Liability Insurance

 Status of WMA's Directors and Officers liability insurance needs to be communicated to the WMA Board to avoid any concerns of coverage.

Women of the Corps Donations

 A clear policy needs to be in place as to when or how members' donations to the Women of the Corps collection can be returned.

Opha May Johnson Project Update

My last article focused on what the project was all about and how we needed everyone's help to get the job done. This article is an update as to where we are now.

We have decided on the desian of the monument that will be placed at the grave site. The monument will be black granite with gold litho etching on four sides. One side will have Opha May's life dates, one will have a Marine Corps emblem and the fact that she was a Sergeant, a third side will have a short history of her service and the fourth side will have an inlay picture of Opha May. The monument will stand about 8 feet from base to the top. The plan is to add some decorative landscaping around the grave site that will help set it apart from others in

the area.

All together the cost of the monument and landscaping is \$30,000. We have set up a donation site at Eventbrite (www.eventbrite.com search for Opha May first woman Marine) and through Facebook (www. facebook.com/womenmarines) so contributions can be made on line. Donors can also mail a check to: Women Marines Association, P.O. Box 377, Oaks, PA 19456-0377 with notation that the funds are for the Opha May Johnson project.

The goal is to have the project completed in time for an unveiling around the time of the Biennial Convention in late August. As of the end of March we have raised \$11,684. The project committee has also sent out donation requests to some corporations but so far no corporate sponsors.

The highlight of the afternoon came when Dr. Moseley Brown shared accomplishments and anecdotes of women Marines throughout history.

After Dr. Moseley Brown came the installation of officers of the two newly formed chapters was conducted. With the assistance of Area 1 Director Jamie DePaola, the ceremony got underway. From the applause that followed for Colleen McCarthy, NY-6 President, and the new officers of NY-7, President StaceyAnn Castro; Vice-President Fran Wagner; Secretary Marie Nuzzi; and Treasurer Christine Glynn, the installation clearly met with everyone's approval!

No Marine Corps celebration is complete without a traditional cake cutting ceremony. The MCJROTC cadets marched in with a beautifully decorated cake that featured the fitting image of a proud woman Marine. A message from the CMC General Robert B. The Holly's Spirit Run/Walk and Kids Fun Run

The amount of details to tell you about the 5K and how it evolved is huge. The beginning was losing our daughter, Corporal Holly Charette, in June 2005.

To keep Holly's name and memory alive, with all her energy that she once brought to our fam-



that she once brought to our family and friends, we created a perpetual scholarship in her name. We had our first pasta dinner in 2006, which turned into an annual steak fry. This dinner is to recognize the scholarship recipients and their families.

Throughout the years since we launched our first scholarship event, members from our family always came and donated and participated to help make each event successful and memorable. Nine years ago, two of our cousins (Tina and Lisa) wanted to contribute their time and energy in a 5K fundraiser event since they are both avid runners and cyclists and have organized similar events for other causes, such as Multiple Sclerosis.

In 2010, we had our first 5K with over 100 participants. We now average over 220 participating each year. This 5K race is certified with the U.S. Track & Field so professional runners can add this event to their resume. There is also a wheel chair division for the 5K and a Kids Fun Run for the very young groups. Besides runners, we welcome walkers, strollers, and leashed dogs.

All donations and proceeds go directly to the scholarship honoring Holly. In addition to the 5K race each May, we have a committee that is helping to raise funds through other means, such as the CpI Holly Charette Memorial Motorcycle Run in September, and "A Night



for Holly" (a comedy event at a local establishment featuring her cousin, Jason, who is a rising star in the comedy world).

The result of the fundraising has raised over \$60,000 in scholarships since 2006. Each year a student from Coventry High School and Cranston East, where Holly was alumni, has received a scholarship of \$2,100.

The only shelter in Rhode Island for homeless female veterans was named "Marine Corporal Holly Charette Home" and we like to regularly provide support to this shelter. We are very honored and pleased that the WMA now has a chapter named after her, RI-2 CpI Holly Charette Chapter. These Marines have become part of our family as they help us with the events to honor their sister and our daughter.

So many of our family and friends, as well as our Marine family, have worked tirelessly each year to make a difference and to keep our daughter's vibrant, energetic, and beautiful spirit alive. We miss Holly every single day, but we've turned our grieving into giving as we remember every little thing about our daughter, our friend, our Marine.

The winners will receive plaques and \$500, \$250, and \$150, respectively, during the 2018 Women Marines Association Convention and Professional Development Symposium.

Excerpt from LtCol Wolny's essay, "Answering the Nation's Call for 100 Years:"

"As women have answered the nation's call to serve, they have upended previously held social norms and replaced them with new ideas about what women can and should do for the nation. Today, the military could not operate as the most powerful military in the world without its women. The significance of women in the military has always been a two-way relationship – the nation needed women as much as the women wanted the opportunity to serve, to be treated as equally important in the nation's defense as its men."



MetroAccess is a shared ride public transportation service for people who are unable to use fixed-route public transit due to disability. "Shared ride" means that multiple passengers may ride together in the same vehicle. MetroAccess fares are two times the fastest comparable fixed-route fare, with a maximum fare of \$6.50. The lowest available fare 15 minutes before and 15 minutes after the requested pick-up time will be provided during the booking process. 

Books Exhibit

You have your honorable discharge certificate and your DD214, but your platoon photo and platoon book are just as important as is any picture of you in uniform. Marines can call MCRD Parris Island Recruit Photo at 843-228-1555 and get a copy of their platoon photo. However, there is no way to order a replacement platoon book.

In the front of the book there are photos of every phase of training. In the back of the book are individual photos of the women that you trained with, formed a bond with and of the Marines in the chain of command that trained you. Most books include the first names of recruits which help locate platoon mates.

Valerie Shields Breidenbaugh, WMA History & Document Curator, has digitized more than 600 platoon books and counting! She also posts her scanned platoon books onto put WMA Shutterfly page and to YellowFootPrints.com. She has had dozens of women email her copies of their platoon books and in turn Valerie has emailed copies to female Marines...far too many to count! What began as a hobby is now her passion. "I so enjoy helping women Marines receive a piece of their personal Marine Corps history" says Valerie.

Bring your platoon book with you to the 2018 Convention. Stop by Valerie's platoon book exhibit table. It will be co-located with the WMA authors. 


