Conduct of Official WMA Business

One of the main purposes of our Biennial Convention is to conduct the official business of our association. A major part of this effort is to review and adopt any proposed amendments to our National Bylaws and Standing Rules during our two business meetings. During the 2018 WMA Convention business meetings on Friday, 31 August and Saturday, 1 September, it was determined that all votes held on Friday were invalid due to not having a quorum. WMA Bylaws, Section 3, Quorum, states "the quorum for a business meeting shall consist of a majority of the active (WMA) members registered 'AT' the convention". Active duty Marines, who were not WMA members, were also counted in the number of attendees which adversely affected the population to determine an actual quorum.

After thorough review of the notes from the Credentials Chair, Bylaws, Roberts Rules of Order Newly Revised, and court reporter transcripts, it was determined that there were not enough "WMA members" present to constitute a quorum. The president declared the two amendments voted on during the first business meeting as null and void. WMA Bylaws, Section 3, states under Voting Procedures that amendments "may be submitted for consideration by ALL ACTIVE MEMBERS by ballot, prepared and mailed by the National Secretary indicating a deadline for re-

Therefore, National will mail ballots to all WMA members to vote on amendments approved by the Board of Directors.

Randy Tidmore and Ruth Gallivan were adored by everyone they met, including being treated to lunch in the private chalets along the flight line. Both were able to watch the Blue Angels perform. Their family mem-

bers reported that such a good time required several days for the ladies to recover.

Attendees had to pass through the CA-2 display to get to the Meet and Greet. There was a table with information about WMA and reference materials on the history of women in the Corps. Surrounding the table were panels with pictures of the various eras and activities of military service in which women were engaged. An additional table featured the Wreaths Across America program, and a three-fold poster board presented highlights, including pictures and programs of the recent WMA national convention in Washington, D.C.

CA-2 worked with other organizations to provide a comprehensive and excitingly large exposition in the hangar dedicated to the centennial of women in the Corps. We were contacted weeks ahead by MCAS Miramar Marketing staff who prepared excellent pillars with large photos, emphasizing women firsts in the Corps. Dockery, California State Senator Joel Anderson and the Commanding General of the 3rd Marine Aircraft Wing, MajGen Kevin M. Liams. A proclamation was presented commending the efforts of MCAS Miramar for honoring 100 years of women in the United States Marine Corps.

1ST TIMERS

Following the handing out of doorprizes, there was historical entertainment of "then and now." In closing, the attendees were challenged to make friends from different eras and take pictures.

OPENING BANQUET

The evening started with a no host reception, then the opening banquet. As a traditional part of the Opening Banquet, chapters participated in the flag ceremony and processional, carrying in their chapter flags. After that, a very impressive color guard from TX-7 presented the national colors. The members of the color guard were: Jackie Bazille, Angela Maness, Audrea Killalea, and Rosa Osborn.

Convention co-chairs Lelia Jackson (DC-1) and Parisa Fetherson (VA-1) welcomed everyone and introduced a video of the unveiling of the marker on Opha May Johnson's grave. This was a very welcome addition to the evening for those (like myself) who didn't make it to the unveiling.

Afterward, Angela Maness, Laura Brown, Rosa Osborn, and Audrea Killalea paid tribute to POWs and MIAs. It was a very moving part of the banquet.

CMC General Robert B. Neller was the guest speaker and spoke of women's contributions to our Corps.

The night ended with the presentation of three National Service Awards:

Jacqueline Caputi, OR-1, was the impetus for the involvement of WMA with the Oregon University program called "We Are Not Invisible," bringing attention to the presence and importance of women veterans, as well as the art presentation of women in combat called "Combat Grass", Jacqueline worked with the project founders and got other members of OR-1 involved to share these programs, not only on campuses, but nationwide in veteran facilities, and even in the Congressional halls. In addition, Jacqueline took it upon herself to research the 1980 existence of the original Women Marine Rose and reignite the OR-1 Lady Marine Rose namesake rose. This led to a partnership with Heirloom Roses to create a new, improved version of the Lady Rose, one that will last through tough winters. Nationwide the new rose will be marketed as the "Because She Served" rose to honor all strong women who have served their country, their family, and their lives.

Rosy Marcelino-Macias, OR-1, joined just prior to the 2016 Biennial Convention and immediately got involved in the planning, registration, and exhibits that lent to the success of the convention. Meanwhile, even as a new member, Rosy took on the position of Vice President of the chapter—and in the frequent absence of the President, she led the OR-1 chapter to get involved with their community, as well as other veteran organizations. Combined events with Red, White, & Blue have brought new members to the WMA. Rosy was a willing and active member of the group of OR-1 Marines who participated in the project "We Are Not Invisible" campaian, as well as the Narrator for the "Combat Grass" exhibit in Salem. In addition, Rosy also added to the WMA exposure by arranging the first known WMA involvement with Oregon's Adopt-a-Street program. Rosy added to the chapter funds by arranging fundraisers including car washes and Zumba-athons, which were to be used to ensure all members had a chance to attend the WMA convention to mark the 100-year anniversary in Washington, DC.

Adrianne McLarahmore, DC-1, assumed the duties of National Treasurer and immediately became aware of a possible issue with our status as a public charity. She worked tirelessly to understand the tax law and WMA's earnings, and provided the required data needed to confirm our public charity status to the IRS. In addition, she was able to file the National 990 tax return for 2016-17 without having to file for an extension which had been the case in several of the previous vears. Adrianne's early tenure also included taking on the responsibility of ensuring all chapters filed their 990N's without risk of losing their 501 (c) 19 tax exemption status. As a result, in 2018, for the first time ever, ALL chapters filed their 990Ns and none are at risk of losing their exemptions.

Adrianne also took on the preparation of WMA's two-year budget and oversaw the Mid-Year Budget review to help ensure WMA's budgetary obligations were maintained throughout the year.

When WMA switched publishers for WMA'Nouncements, it wasn't just a matter of hiring a new printer. WMA had to change its entire process with USPS - the periodical permit had to be updated from San Antonio to Boston and automatic postage payments had to be set up. But knowing that the publication and delivery of 'Nouncements would literally grind to a halt if these things weren't handled, she spent hours learning what had to be done and then filing all the necessary paperwork to make all the needed updates. This process itself took weeks. To the membership this was a seamless change, but behind the scenes it was anything but seamless.


























CLOSING BANQUET
