Molly Marine statues are currently in New Orleans, LA, Parris Island, SC and in front of the Gray Research Center at Quantico, VA. It made me reminisce of the image Molly gives to us all. She stands tall and upright, wearing the eagle, globe and anchor.

The Spirit of Molly Marine lives in all

of us (no matter where we call home). We cross many eras...from the 1940's to those Marines still in uniform. We must work together as a Sisterhood, to respect the history and traditions of our past while we embrace the diversity and changing roles of Marines...as we write the future.

I shared during my Installation address the breathtaking view from I-95 as one drives near the National Museum of the Marine Corps in Quantico, VA.

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### **Special People, Special Projects and New Contacts in History**

#### **Mary Bacon Hale**

Mary Bacon Hale, a WWII Marine, has published three woman Marine history books and has been the major financial supporter of the Women of the Corps Collection. She asked me to include the following in this issue.

Mary (91 years young) wishes to thank the numerous WMA members that have sent her cards and made phone calls to her as she recovers from a heart attack, and broken hip. The vast number of cards to quote Mary "were a wonderful surprise and very thoughtful and kind of the senders and the phone call messages left, certainly made for a happy home coming."

### **Special People**

### **Emma Holmes**

The history of women Marines has been made by some amazing women. One such woman is Emma Holmes. When WMA started a search for the women of WWI who had served as US Marines back in the 1960's, Emma stepped up and offered to tackle the project. Marine Corps sources were short on information, but from the little data she could initially locate. Emma located the names of 130 women who had served. She contacted a small group of them using address information she had located and little by little she contacted all 130 with 77 responding back. Emma then set up a scuttlebutt newsletter program just for these "WWIonderfuls". WWI members would write to Emma and provide info on what they were doing, family activities and Marine Corps memories. Emma would combine the letters and comments and then she would create, type and hand copy all she had received into Scuttlebutt and send it to all the WWI women at personal expense.

Tucked amongst her data and research is the only known copy of a 1918 December *Marines* magazine, the offices the various women worked in and their military specialties.

The WWI ladies also provided more names of women they remembered who had served and those that continued as civil servants in various departments in Washington after the war.

As the last of the WWI ladies passed

on, Emma was packing up her treasures and entrusted all the WWI data to Sue Sousa and Eileen Scanlon for protection. Sue and Eileen lovingly stored these documents and recently, this data was transferred to the Women of the Corps Collection for preservation and research. Emma received many WMA citations over the years for her work, but none that could recognize all she did to save the history of the women who had served as Marines fifty years before she tackled the project. As curator and historian of the WOCC, I want to thank Emma for all she has done to save and create a WWI women's legacy that will never be matched. The data she gathered and preserved is giving us a picture of these Marines, before and after their service.

Interesting Facts from Emma's Files Most women Marines served less than a year on active service with a Reserve commitment until 1923-1924. It appears that eight women reached the highest rank women could hold at that time--Sergeant. They were paid \$1.00 a month while in the reserves or as one woman reservist stated, "Enough for a pair of shoes." The last known unit function was the recall of a platoon of women Marines in 1921 to escort the "Unknown Soldier" of WWI to his final resting place in Arlington Cemetery.

### **Female Engagement Teams**

Our Female Engagement Teams are writing a new chapter on women in the Corps. They are performing tasks never attempted by females in the Corps and performing at amazing levels.

The WOCC is seeking unit letters/

newsletters or personal accounts of these special Marines. If you are serving or have served as a member of a FET, please share your story with us as well as photos. Your history is now and to save it now rather than trying ten years from now, will make it relevant and will protect it as the years go by. We would like their names, hometowns, and FET stories to their amazing performance

of duty. Special Projects NAS El Centro, CA

The Women of the Corps Collection (WOCC) never seems to run out of special projects. Over the last few months, a very special project has developed. The curator was contacted by Navy personnel at NAS El Centro Calif., who are seeking information for its historical exhibit. While researching, they came upon the fact that a large contingent of Women Marines was stationed here in WWII and they wanted to know much more about them.

The immediate data sent on to them was the famous Disney connection to the women Marines at this base. Walt Disney had designed nose art for aircraft, tanks and military units starting in 1941.

By late 1942 Walt Disney, overwhelmed with requests, assigned his cartoonists to take over the project. In 1944, the women Marines assigned to MCAF El Centro, wrote a poem, about their life at El Centro, their jobs repairing planes, the heat, the bugs, and how they wanted a patch to recognize their unit. Their efforts hooked Mr. Disney into creating the patch himself, and it appears that Mr. Disney created the last patch personally. Disney created a cricket like figure with long eyelashes, bright red lipstick, red high heels, with a tool kit and fly swatter in the background. It appears that 100 patches were made for the unit. The WOCC has one of the patches. A photo copy of the patch was sent to NAS El Centro for their exhibit and historical data base.

Also sent were descriptions of the jobs women filled at Marine Corps Air Facilities and Stations.

Photos of the aviation women are the next items that will be sent. A CD is being created to provide the historical photos and visual history of the women for them. Our women worked as plane mechanics, re-fuelers, aircraft gunnery instructors, air traffic controllers, crew transport drivers, weather experts, parachute riggers, celestial navigators and instructors, to name a few.

#### WWI

The farther removed we become from WWI, the less information appears to be available. Sara Phoenix, working as the then deputy curator, took on the project of finding the names of as many WWI

women as possible. It has been slow going, as the Marine Corps had a list of 130 women names researched back in the 1960's for WMA. Of this list not all names were accurate. Sara used documents available at the Marine Corps History Division, the WOCC, newspapers, etc. to increase the number to more than 250 names. Once the names were added to the database others were added from news articles and other sources.

During a recent visit to HQMC, I spoke with Major General Angela Salinas. MGen. Salinas stepped into the project and provided the assistance of one of her historians, JoAnn Lovell, a retired CWO4 and Marine Corps historian in Records Branch.

They are providing the WWI project with the names and service numbers of the women they have located. This has been a huge assistance to us. In addition, names gathered by Emma Holmes will also be added and researched.

#### **New History Contacts**

The Pritzger Military Library, founded in 2003, is hitting the museum world with a world class library and collections that will add much to the military knowledge of the United States. The library is located in downtown Chicago and is open to the public for research. In addition to the library, they hold a complete collection of US poster art for all the wars from WWI on. They are willing to copy any poster you may have interest in. If you live in Chicago or around it, or plan a trip to Chicago, make a stop at the library. I provided them with additional organizations to contact to spread the word on this unique, one of a kind library, dedicated to America's citizen soldier. The library is located at 104 S. Michigan Ave,, Chicago, IL and their website is pritzkermilitarylibrary.org.

They would also like to do oral histories on you as well. The WOCC will be utilizing their archives and will provide them with data from the WOCC.

Remember all the things we were taught in the Corps, some even before we actually got to boot camp or OCS? At our convention in Philadelphia, "sisterly" love flowed everywhere. I saw it in the middle-aged veteran who helped the WWII veteran whose credit card was stolen. I saw it when a very young Marine cried as she listened to the story of the oldest of our veterans. I saw it in the interaction between so many generations of Marines, each understanding how the dedication and professionalism of all eras has led us to a time where gender barriers and biases have almost disappeared.

Those of you who were not able to be with us were remembered in spirit and I know that you, too, in your own way are sharing your talents and love with your WMA Chapters, families, churches and communities.







# PHILADELPHIA 2012: WMA RETURNS TO THE CITY WHERE THE CORPS BEGAN IN 1775

**Thursday, 30 August** We had a Molly Marine Celebration where we all learned a great deal about Molly Marine and we got an opportunity to honor the Molly Marine recipients who were present.

We currently have Molly Marine statues in New Orleans, LA; at Quantico, VA; and at Parris Island, SC.

There is also a fourth statue which we are trying to raise money to place as a Rally Point at the National Museum of the Marine Corps in Quantico, VA.

**Friday, 31 August:** I started the day with the WMA Board meeting and we discussed some interesting changes.

One significant action was to disband 9 chapters due to inactivity and lack of officers. These include RI-1, FL-1, NC-2, IN-2, AR-1, TX-4, NV-1, AK-1, and WA-1.

Shaaron Wright also attended the LE Board meeting where they solicited candidates for all their national offices.

This was the first day that the PX was open and there were many wonderful things to purchase from shirts to jewelry and everything in between.

The PX was open three days and appeared to do quite well because there were a lot of visitors. In the afternoon, we held the first timers meeting and the ladies from Texas put on a great program.

All three generals spent at least an hour following the ceremony taking photos with everyone who asked. At the end of the Opening Ceremony, Rhonda Amtower announced two National Service Award winners; Mary Ellen Stone and Kathy Wright.

We were both very surprised and honored to be in the company of the wonderful women who have won this award.

I want to thank all the women in Area 10 for your support during my two year tour as Area Director because I couldn't have done this without your help and support!

**Saturday, 1 September** We started the day with the 1st business meeting and went through all the proposed changes to By-Laws and Standing Rules, but did not actually vote. We also got a short presentation from the team hosting the next convention in Kansas City, MO in 2014.

This convention in being held in July instead of August/September and the hotel is located right in the heart of town so everything is convenient. There is also a large mall attached to the hotel. It should be lots of fun.

At noon, we had a luncheon to welcome home warriors who had served in Iraq and/ or Afghanistan and there were many at the luncheon.

Additionally, BGen. Reynolds swore in 22 female poolies from Philadelphia who will be off to boot camp soon. They were such young women and they had a great time visiting with all the current and past Marines after the luncheon.

The rest of the afternoon was filled with classes and the evening brought opening day for the Loyal Escorts' Patriots Pub.

We had some terrific dancers among the active duty women and they really put on some great entertainment with their very lively line dancing.

They even got a few of the WWII ladies out there putting down their moves. Shaaron Wright and Don Johnson came in period costumes and many photos were taken with them.

**Sunday, 2 September** The day started with a fun run/walk around the area just outside the hotel and a lot of folks showed up for that event.

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They were singing, calling cadence and generally having a great time. Free time followed so that the ladies could attend church or enjoy some personal time. The PX re-opened to brisk business and the Area Directors/Chapter Presidents had their first meeting with the 1st Vice President.

At 1530, we held our Memorial Service and the names of 215 of our sisters who passed since the last convention were read. Additionally, 12 Loyal Escorts were also honored at this service. The Sometime Singers provided background music, Denne Howard of 29-Palms played Taps, Betty Printzy-Simms of DC-1 played the keyboard and it was a very sad but lovely event. The day closed with more fun and games at the Patriot's Pub hosted by the Loyal Escorts.

Monday, 3 September We opened the day with our 2nd WMA Business Meeting. At this meeting, we voted on all the proposed changes which were published in the last 'Nouncements. Two of the changes are worth mentioning. The membership voted to stop the transfer of \$50 upon the death of a life member to the Scholarship Fund and leave the funds in the General Fund. In recent years, the Scholarship Fund has received several very large donations and that fund is very well funded. The General Fund is not in such great shape, so it was determined that we would keep the money in the General Fund to help support other WMA activities.

The second item was the addition of two new membership categories. We previously had Active and Honorary members but now we have two additional categories titled "Supporters" and "Compassionate Retention." The Supporters are business sponsors who make large donations to WMA on an annual basis but they do not have voting rights. The Compassionate Retention category is designed to prevent older TERM members who can no longer pay dues to remain on the active membership database and to be eligible for inclusion in the appropriate Memorial Service when they pass. All TERM members over 75 who fail to renew their dues will be placed into this category. Additionally, LIFE members who become incapacitated due to physical or mental issues may also be designated for Compassionate Retention. These members will remain on the rolls with a special designator in their expiration date, however, they will no longer receive the RM&D or the 'Nouncements Newsletters.





If you have friends or chapter members who qualify for Compassionate Retention, please notify your Area Director so that she can get their records updated with this new membership status. This category was created to prevent long term members from dropping off the rolls just prior to their death and thus become ineligible for inclusion at the appropriate Memorial Service. Compassionate Retention protects members with dementia, Alzheimers, blindness, or needing full time care in a nursing facility.

The next big event was the Recognition and Awards Ceremony and there were many surprises at this event. Many chapters entered for the first time and most of them went home with one or more streamers for their flags. Area 10 had winners from CA-3, CA-7 and CA-8 with CA-8 winning their first 2 streamers ever! Congratulations to all who entered and especially to all who won. Start now preparing your entries for the next convention. We love to see new entrants do well but if you don't enter, you can't win. DC-1 entered just about every category for the first time and they did very well as did LA-1. The list of winners is included in this issue. Monday was also the last day for the PX and the Patriots Pub and attendance at both was very high.

**Tuesday, 4 September** This was the final day and it brought two major events - Installation of new National Officers for 2012-2014 and the Closing Banquet. Our new Area 10 Director is Kara Harris and she resides in San Diego. Don't hesitate to contact Kara if you need help with WMA matters. She will be providing her contact information to all the chapters very soon.

The new National President is Betty Mosely Brown and nobody can say OORAH quite like Betty. We wish the entire board great success.

### New Orleans based Women Marines Awarded for their Achievements

Since Opha May Johnson signed the dotted line in 1918, women have been making their mark in United States Marine Corps history. To ensure the traditions and history of women Marines are passed on to new generations, the Women Marines Association was established in 1960.

The Molly Marine chapter LA-1 of New Orleans received multiple awards at their recent WMA convention and professional development conference; including the most prestigious award given: the Ruth and Dick Broe Award.

More than 70 WMA chapters competed in five categories of awards: newsletter, history book, website, recruiting, and chapter achievement. The Molly Marine chapter entered two categories in the chapter achievement competition and placed first in "volunteerism" and "Esprit de Corps, patriotism and camaraderie."

"There are so many things, just in the last two years, that we've done," said Cpl. Elizabeth Damron, the special projects officer for the Molly Marine chapter. The main volunteer event, that is near to each member's heart, is the annual Molly Marine statue clean-up. After Mardi Gras each year, the chapter makes it their mission to restore the first Molly Marine statue, sculpted in 1943, to its original state. Other events include feeding the homeless, cleaning up the Audubon Zoo, regular visits to nursing homes, and hosting multiple fundraisers.

It is because of events like these, that the chapter received the Ruth and Dick Broe Award. This most-celebrated award is given to the one chapter that has demonstrated overall chapter achievement over the past two years.

"As area director, I am so proud of our Louisiana chapter; their active participation in community events is commendable and they are well deserving of the award," said Maria Crowley, Women Marines Association area six director.

The local Molly Marine chapter was presented with a plaque that has been shared among chapters since 1998. On Monday, Oct. 15, the chapter presented the award to Lt. Gen. Steven A. Hummer, commander of Marine Forces Reserve.

"This is a great honor, thank you so much," said Hummer. "I'm privileged to be the commander of Marine Forces Reserve at this time and to be able to receive this wonderful plaque."

The plaque will hang at the Marine Corps Support Facility New Orleans until the next convention in 2014 when the Molly Marine chapter will be presented with a personalized, permanent plaque to be placed in the building.

In the next two years, the Molly Marine chapter plans on doing even more volunteer events and increasing member participation.

"We've done such an awesome job the past two years. I see us improving by maybe doing a little bit more volunteerism and community service," said Melanie L. Young, president of the Molly Marine chapter.

### Service Members, Veterans Celebrate Military Legacy of Women

WASHINGTON, Oct. 22, 2012 - Hundreds of active-duty women and veterans turned out Oct. 20 at the gateway to Arlington National Cemetery to celebrate the legacy of more than 2.5 million women who have served in the nation's military.

Former WACs, WAVEs, WMs, WAFs and SPARS shared with their activeduty counterparts in the contributions women have made to the U.S. military that are enshrined at the Women in Military Service for America Memorial.

dedicated by President Bill Clinton on Oct. 18, 1997.

While WIMSA serves as a memorial to all of America's service women, Wilma L. Vaught, president of the Women's Memorial Foundation, said she doesn't consider it a museum, though the building does contain a gift store and features numerous artifacts and photographic exhibits.

"This is more than a memorial: it's an educational center meant to tell the story of women in the military from the American Revolution through Iraq — it was an opportunity to tell the story of women's service individually and collectively," said Vaught, who enlisted in the Air Force in 1957 and went on to retire as a briga-

dier general in 1985 as one of only flag officers in all of the services at the time.

Vaught said WIMSA was also created because many women going back to World War II felt they never received recognition for all they did - from the nurse corps of the Army and Navy to the Army Air Corps WASPs who delivered fighter and bomber aircraft across the country. WIMSA also honors all women who served overseas during conflicts such as those who served with the Red Cross, USO and Special Services.

"They deserved recognition, because they changed the military and they changed life in America for women [and] because they stepped out and did things women hadn't done before. ... They created a new day for women," she said. "Many of today's military women go through the memorial and realize for the first time what women in the military did before them.

"We stand on the shoulders of all these women who met up with all kinds of obstacles and barricades and they overcame them," Vaught added. "Today, they can say, 'I can have a career, I can have the opportunities for education, I can have a family and be in the military, when they couldn't stay in the military if they were pregnant."

The afternoon ceremony included memories from active duty or retired speakers from each service branch who told the stories of why they served and the challenges they faced at the point in history in which they joined.

Speakers included Allison A. Hickey, undersecretary of veterans affairs for benefits and a retired brigadier general, whose military career started when she graduated from the Air Force Academy in 1980 — the first class to include women. Too many women veterans just fade away, she said, not thinking too much about their service after they leave the military.

She encouraged women veterans to stand proudly and declare themselves veterans, and did so herself. No fewer than 10 other women stood and joined in the declaration.

Keynote speaker Jessica L. Wright, assistant secretary of defense for reserve affairs, was the Army National Guard's first woman CH-47 Chinook aviator. She began her association with the Army by enlisting in 1975, obtained her bachelor's degree and retired as a major general in 2010 after commanding the

Pennsylvania National Guard.

"There's not a better or [more] fitting place to pause and reflect on those contributions than here at the Women's Memorial." She said. "It is a wonderful testament of the power of women in the service to our country. This monument honors the legacy and the proud and distinguished service of women. With every passing day, there is a new and enthusiastic group of young women who join the list of forbearers that we honor here today. They have the same determination and courage that runs through our current serving women that was in our predecessors."

WIMSA Foundation officials hope to have 250,000 women veterans in the memorial's historical record by the end of the year. Vaught said they're just 301 shy that figure, and that she's confident the foundation will reach its goal.

What she's less sure about, she said, is raising the \$3 million needed annually to meet payroll and maintenance of the 33,000 square-foot education center. She said the memorial has an average of about 150,000 visitors a year. "Not too bad a number," she added, "but I had hoped that given there's about 4.5 million who visit Arlington every year, we would see about 500,000 visitors. I think that would solve our economic problems."

## Marine Corps hosts 37th annual Marine Corps Marathon

Not even the threat of a hurricane could prevent the running of the 37th Marine Corps Marathon Oct. 28. As the District of Columbia braced for the winds and rain of Hurricane Sandy, 23,864 runners and thousands of spectators filled the streets of the nation's capital for the historic 26.2-mile endurance challenge. Not all participants were technically able to run. More than 140 wheelchair and handcyclists, some of whom lost limbs or suffered paralyzing injuries in various combat-related incidents, also competed in the challenge.

The race began with two Marine Medium Tiltrotor Squadron 22 MV-22B Ospreys flying from the Pentagon over the starting line, and the thunderous boom of a 105mm Howitzer.

Lt. Col. Rob Riggle, notable actor, comedian and Marine Corps reservist, served as this year's official race starter. Spc. Augustus Maiyo finished the 26.2 miles first, posting a time of 2 hours, 20 minutes, 20 seconds. Maiyo, running his first marathon – ever – was impressed by his finishing time. "It's a one in a million [chance of happening]," Maiyo said. "It's exciting. I worked really hard along the way. It's a lift to finish." More than 11,000 participants competed in their first marathon along with Maiyo. Runners aged 14 to 86 endured the rigors of the course.

Kim Phillips, a first-time runner from San Antonio, said she was well prepared to complete the task before she even began.

"This is probably the best for me because the communication before the race was phenomenal," Phillips said. "The Marines wanted everyone to finish. And knowing that the race supports the Marine Corps makes it more meaningful."

The MCM course featured two time hurdles, which runners had to complete to officially continue the course. Participants had to maintain at least a 14 minute-per-mile pace to reach the National Mall Gauntlet at mile 17.5 by 12:20 p.m. Runners then had to reach the 14th Street Bridge and successfully "Beat the Bridge" just after mile marker 20 by 1:05 p.m., before the bridge was reopened to Washington downtown traffic. Other than the excitement of completing a marathon, there is always a competition within this race that goes unnoticed by many spectators.

Annually, members of the British Royal Navy and Royal Marines travel thousands of miles to compete against the US Marine Corps All-Marine team in the Challenge Cup Competition. This year's competition was as close as ever, with the Royal Navy/Royal Marines team edging the Marines by one second. Staff Sgt. Michael Wood, a first-time runner with the All-Marine running team, was the second Marine from the team to cross the finish line, finishing in a time of 2:37:26.

"It was great with all the crowd out there," Wood said. "Wearing the jersey, everyone sees you and shouts 'Ooh-Rah' and "Semper Fi.' You get caught up in the crowd and realize you're running 30 seconds faster than you should be. But it was a great experience."

But not all runners ran the marathon for competition. Many runners participated to honor family members killed in combat while serving their nation. Others ran in support of their favorite charity.

As he crossed the finish line, one runner explained his group was raising money for families that don't have the money to provide medical equipment to their special needs children.

Another runner said he was running for Team Travis and Brendan, a team honoring Marine 1st Lt. Travis L. Manion, killed in 2007during his second tour in Iraq, and Navy Lt. Brendan J. Looney, a SEAL killed in Afghanistan in 2010. The two service members were roommates at the US Naval Academy and are buried next to each other in Arlington National Cemetery.

Another marathon participant ran in support of Goose Perez, a bi-athlete friend who is battling cancer for the fourth time.

The Fisher House based in Boston fielded a team of about 450 runners supporting their organization.

As runners crossed the finish line, some burst in tears or leaped into the air

in triumph; others raised their hands in victory or yelled shouts of joy. Couples hugged and kissed as they finished the race together. Some put on a last burst of speed to cross the finish line before their legs gave out or they crumpled in pain.

All were a testament to the dedication required to run 26.2 miles in keeping with the Marine Corps Marathon mission: to promote physical fitness, generate community goodwill and showcase the organizational skills of the United States Marine Corps.

Known as the People's Marathon, this is the largest marathon to not offer prize money. It is the fourth largest marathon in the nation and ninth largest in the world.

This year's Colorado Independent Publishers Association, CIPA Education and Literacy Foundation's EVVY competition brought in the second largest number of book entries in the history of the awards! This year's competition was open to e-books and audio books and was one of the best ever! The 18th CIPA Awards were held at the Lone Tree Arts Center in Lone Tree, Colorado 17 May and CO-1's Vice President/Treasurer, Carron Barrella entered the contest. Her book, More Than 36 Days, was awarded the CIPA EVVY Award in the Biography category. This award winning book tells the stories of four WWII Marines who fought on Iwo Jima. It is not a war book as it focuses

more on the men, their backgrounds and how their war experience defined them. Max Brown is married to long time WMA member and WWII Woman Reserve member, Shirley Gunston Brown, who is also in the book.

Adding to Carron's note as an author is the fact that the proceeds will benefit the Rocky Mountain Association for Brain Injuries, a 501 (c) 3 non-profit organization located in Louisville, Colo. Their hyperbaric chamber treatments have had miraculous results with Traumatic Brain Injury and Post Traumatic Stress Disorder.

Carron toured the schools in the Metro Denver area with these men listening to their stories and realized that this is the last generation of children that will hear their stories live. She wanted to preserve the memory of the men and their history for future generations and thought, "If I don't write it, who will?" She dreamed of becoming a writer since high school (Chicago, IL) and this provided the perfect impetus.

### **Chapter Tool Kit: Finding and Recruiting New Members**

The 2012 Convention in Philadelphia, without any exaggeration, was a great time with some great people in a great place! Those who attended could not help but be moved by the intergenerational sisterhood that was on display all week. That's what Women Marines Association is all about...Marines of all eras and ages coming together to preserve the history and tradition of women who have worn the eagle, globe, and anchor.

With Convention behind us, however, it is time to take some of the good feeling...the warm, rosy glow of the camaraderie we enjoyed over Labor Day and direct our attention to how we can use that esprit to make our chapters bigger and better. We know that we have many chapters who struggle with the bare minimum number of members to continue to qualify as an active chapter.

Many of these chapters are in areas, not near active duty bases, where there are not WMA members-at-large to recruit to chapter membership. Our problem has generally been that if they don't already belong to WMA, we have no way of finding them. While we were at convention, several ways for chapters to find and recruit new members were shared by chapters that have either enjoyed success with these methods or are planning on trying them this fall.

• Visiting Reserve units in your area and providing WMA postcards with chapter contact information and an invitation to join the chapter. I and I staffs/Reserve units cannot give out personal information on women who come through their centers, but usually will be more than willing to make the information available at the unit for women Marines to pick up. They may also let you post information on the unit bulletin board.

• **Posting** WMA National and local contact information on public bulletin boards, particularly at VA Hospitals,

American Legion/VFW/Marine Corps League posts, and in public libraries.

• Running no-cost community activity ads in local newspapers, with a short explanation about WMA and contact information for the local chapter.

Many of you will probably think of other unique ways to identify fellow Marines. Share them! Remember that as chapters, your first contact for advice is your Area Director. She is also your first contact when you have a good idea to pass on that may benefit other chapters. We have several new Area Directors, but all of the ADs and their contact information can be found in this issue of Nouncements . If your chapter has a great idea to share, or if your chapter is in doubt about something and can't find a reasonable answer in the RM&D or your How to Book call or email your Area Director.


