last one in Washington, DC, thanks to her niece accompanying her. She passed away on September 9, 2019.

Grace Carle joined the Marine Corps when she was 20, and was in the last class to train at Hunter College in New York. Training at that time was only three weeks long. The curriculum consisted of lessons about Marine Corps rules and regulations. She remembered the Corps was more focused on getting them through basic training and into the field to free more men to fight. She graduated on 3 July 1943, and a week later had orders to go to Headquarters Marine Corps (which ended up being her first and her last duty station).

For those admin troops out there, Grace started as what would be considered an 0151.

In February 1945, she shipped to Hawaii and on her 23rd birthday, marched down the main street in a parade on the day Japan surrendered. She rotated stateside where she was discharged on 7 November 1945.

In 1948, living in Los Angeles, Grace joined the voluntary training unit that became the nucleus for the Women Recruiting Platoon, 13th Infantry Battalion. She went back on active duty in 1950 when the Marine Corps mobilized this unit for the Korean conflict. In August 1951, Grace integrated into the regular Marine Corps.

Her greatest desire was to learn everything she could. She would constantly seek out the women surrounding her to see how they behaved. She would also determine how this behavior made them successful. So, when she set her goals, she would adopt some of those habits and lead in the successful manner as other women Marines have led. She

Recruits between April 1974 and October 1976 recited that every night for the eight weeks they were in boot camp, along with other governmental VIPs like the President and Vice President of the United States, Secretary of the Navy, Commandant, and Director of Women Marines. I served on active duty from 1973 to 1978 and Grace A. Carle has been "my" Sergeant Major, even when women Marine companies were disbanded in 1977. It was a thrill to finally meet her at a convention many years ago, and still a thrill to see her at the

always believed that if you want to be successful and to become a great leader, you must work hard to achieve that goal. She applied this to all areas of her Marine Corps experience.

Other duty stations included MCAS El Toro, Quantico, and Parris Island. During May and June of 1956, she was one of three women Marines to attend the first class on the Uniform Code of Military Justice School that was held at Camp DelMar, CA.

In 1958 while at PI, she and SgtMaj Ouida Craddock assisted in the physical education program for the elementary grades at the Depot Dependent School in their off time.

Next came duty at Camp Pendleton, then Camp Lejeune, back to PI for training, then to Okinawa. Next it was on to Quantico and the Woman Officer School (WOS). Later she became the SgtMaj of WOS.

As the assistant on Woman Officer Selection Duty to the 8th District in New Orleans, she and 1stLt JoAnn Canal exceeded their quota, recruiting more females to join the Marine Corps as officers from New Mexico, Louisiana, Oklahoma, Arkansas, and Texas, leading the nation in overall results in 1964 and 1965.

In 1974 at Henderson Hall she was named the sixth SgtMaj of Women Marines. She worked with then Col Margaret Brewer, the last Director of Women Marines. Her job was to travel with Col Brewer to different bases talking to women Marines. She also enjoyed being a part of the discussions that advised the Marine Corps about their thinking on what women could and could not do.

Grace decided to retire on 31 October 1976. She had her retirement parade at 8th & I and was awarded the Navy Achievement Medal for playing a role in shaping how women Marines would seamlessly integrate without any incident with male Marines. She and SgtMaj June V. Andler,...

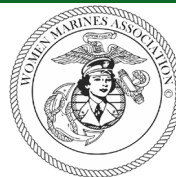

fifth SgtMaj of Women Marines, were the only women Marines to have such a distinction of a parade at 8th & I.

In June 1977, the Marine Corps officially integrated the women and male Marine companies.

"I like to think that I have the distinction of being 'LAST'. I was in the eighth and last regiment that trained at Hunter College. I was the second and 'LAST' SgtMaj of Women Marines to have their retirement parade at Marine Barracks, 8th & I. My first and 'LAST' duty stations were at Headquarters Marine Corps. I was the sixth and 'LAST' SgtMaj of Women Marines", she said.

Grace Carle was a life member of WMA, having Life Member #174. During her time with WMA, she served as president of the Redwood Chapter (CA-9) from February 1987 to February 1990.

In a video posted in March 2018, SgtMaj Carle had this to say:

"I am very pleased that we have come this far. I know I'm a trailblazer, I know I have opened doors for women, and I am very proud of the fact that they have walked through those doors and they have continued to open doors for those women who will be coming behind them. We have proven that we are worthy to be called Marines, and we have worked very hard at it and will continue to work very hard at proving that they are Marines."

If you're wondering why she is so important, you have to understand this is being written by a Marine who felt during that time that the Director and SgtMaj of Women Marines were OUR equivalents to the Commandant and SgtMaj of the Marine Corps. And because younger Marines truly wouldn't be where they are if it wasn't for Grace Amy Carle. She was a true trailblazer, a woman Marine who served during THREE wars and fought for advancements for women Marines. She was the last of the last. Semper Fidelis to a warrior whose service is honored beyond measure, as well as her friendship...Sergeant Major Grace A. Carle.

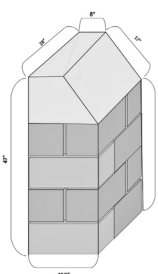

Monument

We are providing a memorial monument to honor the World War II Women Reserves.

Dimensions are listed in inches unless noted otherwise.
-Upper section is 10' high and 10' wide at the top.
-The monument is a 10' x 10' x 10' cube.
-The base is 10' x 10' x 10'.



In 1945, there were 18,000 women serving, 690 women were stationed at Marine Corps Base, San Diego from 1943 through 1946. Not many people realize just how many women were serving on the base at that time. We feel it is important to recognize this unique time in the base's history.

In order to have this monument on the base, we essentially offered a gift that was approved and accepted by the Commanding General. This gift, by law, has to be at no cost to the government. This means that we must pay for everything to include the installation. The monument will be placed in front of the building that served as the barracks, quarters for the officers, and other battalion facilities for these women.

Specific duties of each position can be provided by the Nomination Committee. The key qualifiers for a board position are commitment, time, and experience. All candidates should be able to spend at least eight hours a week on WMA business. Some positions may require more and others less. Must have a good working knowledge of MS Word, and Excel. Must have a computer/laptop and Wi-Fi. Must be able to attend the annual board meetings at either the Biennial Convention or Interim Board Meeting (IBM). Be available for periodic conference calls to conduct official business.

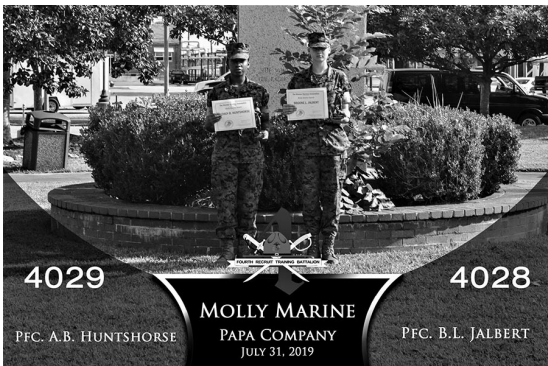

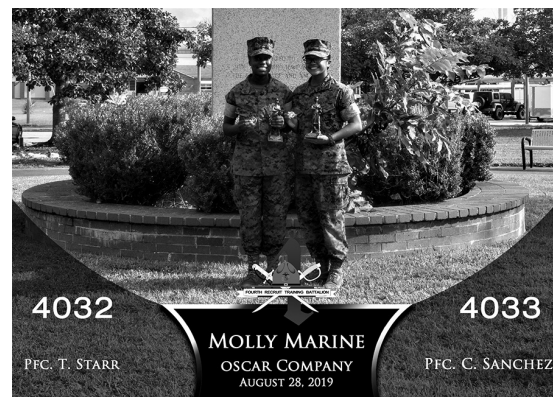

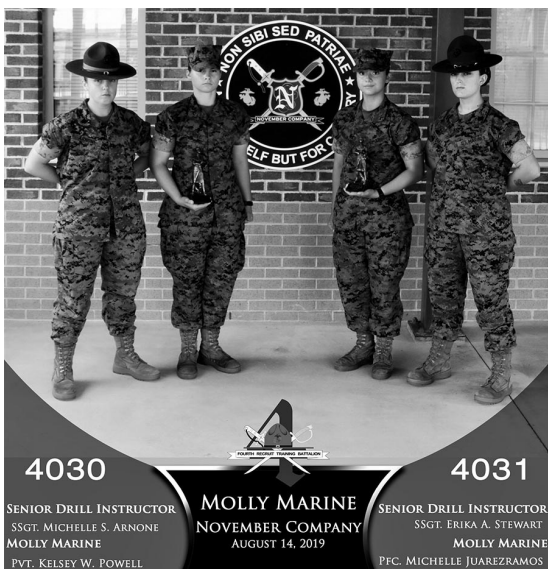

More firsts for female pilots



Capt. Anneliese Satz is the Marine Corps' first-ever female F-35B Lighting II Joint Strike Fighter jet pilot. The 29-year-old from Boise, Idaho, has spent the past four years training as a naval aviator. Now, she's cleared to operate the cutting-edge fifth-generation stealth, supersonic fighter aircraft in combat. She's the first woman to complete the F-35B Basic Course, designed specifically for the Marine Corps variant of the fighter jet.

Satz is joining the "Green Knights" with the Japan-based Marine Fighter Attack Squadron 121. VMFA-121 was the first F-35B squadron to complete an operational deployment with a Marine expeditionary unit aboard a Navy ship.

Satz was licensed to fly the single-engine Robinson R44 light helicopter before joining the Marine Corps. Since switching to fixed wing, she's flown the T-6 Texan II tandem-seat, turboprop trainer and the T-45C Goshawk carrier capable jet trainer, which prepares naval aviators for tactical missions.

She then joined Marine Fighter Attack Training Squadron 501, where she trained to fly the military's newest fighter jet. Showing up and working hard are what allowed her to succeed, she said. Satz also credited the instructors, maintainers and other members of Marine Fighter Attack Training Squadron 501 for helping her complete the F-35B Basic Course.

While her graduation just happened, another female Marine, 1stLt. Catherine Stark, was recently the first female Marine selected to train and fly the F-35C. Stark recently had her aviation wings pinned on during a ceremony aboard Naval Air Station Kingsville, TX, following completion of flight school on August 2. Stark will soon begin nine to 12 months of F-35C training at the Navy's F-35C Fleet Replacement Squadron in Lemoore, CA.

Stark was the first female Marine selected to train on the F-35C. She has spent the past 18 months training on the Beechcraft T-6 Texan II and the McDonnell Douglas T-45 Goshawk. She graduated from the U.S. Naval Academy with a degree in aerospace engineering and was commissioned as a Marine officer in 2016. She will continue to her assigned fleet replacement squadron to fly the F-35C II Joint Strike Fighter jet aircraft. Stark is the first female Marine to be assigned to the Navy's F-35C FRS.

While the first female Marines are entering the F-35 pilot community, other female pilots have come before them.

The Marines have 86 F-35 pilots across the Corps, but are authorized to have 263, according to data obtained by Marine Corps Times through a government records request. The data is current as of February.

The F-35C is the aircraft carrier variant of the high-tech stealth fighter. The Corps is procuring both the F-35B and F-35C variants of the stealth aircraft. The F-35B allows for short take-off and vertical landing and can be deployed from the Navy's amphibious assault ships. The Corps plans to procure 353 F-35Bs and 67 F35Cs, according to the Marine Corps' 2019 aviation plan.

Women Veteran Suicides

After four years on active duty, Amy left the Army and moved back to her hometown. However, she struggled to find her tribe. At work, she was told her handshake was a bit too firm and lectured about how her direct communication style made her coworkers uncomfortable. At her local VFW bar, the men stopped talking to stare at her, and her attempts to connect were met with awkward silences. A few other attempts to connect with the veteran communities she saw advertised at the VA and Facebook left her feeling similarly displaced. "In both civilian settings and veteran settings, I was 'weird,'" she recalls.

She explored some of the newer veteran service organizations (VSOs), but most failed to include child care or weren't kid-friendly. Amy was a single parent, so she mentally crossed those options off her list too. She stayed lonely, and slowly sank into a deep depression.

The very word "veteran" calls to mind the image of a man — particularly a male combat veteran. However, there are more than 2 million women veterans in the United States today, and women veterans are the nation's fastest-growing veteran population. Unfortunately, this unique population, many of whom have deployed during the past 18 years, rarely benefit from the traditional trappings of the hero returned home.

"Invisible Veterans," an anthology released this summer by Praeger Publishing, outlines what happens — for better and worse — when women veterans like Amy return home and begin the long reintegration process. My co-editor and I assembled the latest research alongside powerful personal stories to paint a comprehensive picture of the return of these largely invisible veterans, and in doing so discovered that in many ways, challenges and health risks for women veterans are significantly greater than those facing their male counterparts.

A lonely and dangerous civilian reality

Stories like Amy's are common. Young veterans in general, and women specifically, often report they feel unwelcome in the very places created to support service members. While on active duty, many women veterans work to hide their differences out of fear of visibility. They work to blend in with their male counterparts, and try to mask issues like traumatic stress, domestic violence and substance use. Many male veterans also experience these issues, but are more likely to seek help and to find resources on the other side.

As women move into the civilian world, existing challenges are compounded by the limited services and care systems, both non-profit and government, available to women. Women veterans also report that they leave the military with less of a very important factor: social support. Social support provides astonishing protective health benefits, to include lowered stress hormones, lowered risk of suicide and better overall physical health.

Social alienation, on the other hand, is even more dangerous to your health than smoking. It leads to increased levels of stress hormones, and when they're elevated too long, you may begin to have difficulty communicating, displaying empathy or engaging in high-level thinking. All of these things make connecting with others even more challenging, and your isolation can easily become self-perpetuating.

Particularly for women veterans, that the combination

of invisibility and isolation combine to create deadly consequences post-service.

For instance, women veterans are 250 percent more likely than civilian women to commit suicide. And women who do not use VA services have seen a 98 percent increase in suicide rates. To us, the numbers are more than just statistics. Behind them lie heart-wrenching story after heart-wrenching story. As editors of “Invisible Veterans,” and as Marines turned academic researchers, we know these stories well. In fact, both of us were almost part of these grim suicide statistics.

Once a Marine, always a Marine

My co-editor and I have a personal investment in the stories and health outcomes of women veterans, because these stories and data points are also our own. We are Marines. Although no longer in uniform, we continue our service as academic researchers and accidental activists.

Kyleanne Hunter was a Cobra pilot and is a decorated combat veteran. I served as military police. We spent our 20s in the Corps, and it quickly became both our family and identity. We each deployed overseas and generally loved our time in service. However, transitioning to civilian life was another matter entirely. We were high performing, but — despite appearing “successful” and “normal” on the outside — we each felt a nagging sense of displacement and not belonging.

We missed the sense of unit cohesion and good-natured support we’d so often enjoyed on active duty, and struggled to find that same sense of community in our civilian lives. Further, we had a hard time carving out new identities. We were young, with intense personalities. We knew how to push the gas, but rarely the brake. We wore masks of invulnerability and strength, but felt lonely and often isolated.

Even today, years after leaving the military, we find ourselves still searching for our place in a society that simultaneously praises veterans while unconsciously ignoring women.

What does it mean to go from being the most visible Marines to the most invisible veterans? How does a woman make that transition successfully? These are the questions we sought to answer through “Invisible Veterans.”

Reaching women veterans

The research and stories we compiled illustrate the fact that women veterans share many of the exact same concerns of our male colleagues. However, transition is made more difficult by the lack of services and social support we find as we depart the service.

The good news is that resilience can be taught, and our work illuminated many success stories. We learned of women leveraging a unique formula of social support, spirituality and self-care to overcome their sense of isolation, and to form new identities post-service. These women often go on to become leaders in business, government and local communities, and to thrive through challenging times.

We also discovered that those hoping to reach women veterans must acknowledge that many women veterans do not feel like current efforts are effective. For example, unavailability of childcare is often an insurmountable barrier to participation in a program or service, particularly since women are more likely to be the primary caregivers to dependent children.

Women veterans who have experienced trauma may

be less likely to participate in a mixed-sex setting. Instead, an offering that includes a single-sex environment is more likely to see participation. Making services and programming as effective for female veterans as it is for male veterans is a leadership challenge. However, the effort can succeed if prioritized. Government agencies, non-profits, communities of faith, academic institutions and companies all have a role to play.

So, too, do male veterans. Whether part of a traditional or newer VSO, or simply a member of the broader veteran community, be on the lookout for female veterans. Make an effort to welcome them into your professional networks, clubs and communities. Help these invisible veterans feel seen once more.

Defense Department to make sexual harassment a crime

Defense Department officials will make sexual harassment a criminal offense amid new reports of increasing bad behavior among service members.

In a statement Thursday morning, acting Defense Secretary Patrick Shanahan called the move a necessary step to combat the “scourge” of sexual assault and abuse in the ranks.

A new report from the department’s Sexual Assault Prevention and Response office shows the number of reported cases of sexual assault in the ranks rose from nearly 4,800 in fiscal 2016 to more than 6,050 in fiscal 2018.

Based on reporting rates (about one in three service members reported their assaults to authorities, according to researchers), officials estimated the actual number of assaults in the military for fiscal 2018 at about 20,500 cases, a rise of nearly 38 percent the previous two years.

“Within the female active force, increases were concentrated among service women ages 17 to 24 as well as junior enlisted women, who are already at the highest risk for sexual assault,” the report states. “Most perpetrators were in the E3 to E5 rank, and alleged perpetrators were often the same grade, or slightly higher, than the victim.”

A day earlier, during testimony on Capitol Hill, Shanahan promised new action to deal with issues of harassment and retaliation against victims of those assaults. Defense officials said they hope to have new criminal penalties in place by this October, including “steps to seek a stand-alone military crime of sexual harassment.”

The department also announced plans for new training for commanders and a new program to root out serial sex offenders, as well as “efforts to select recruits of the highest character.” Specifics of all of those initiatives have not yet been identified.

In the memo announcing the changes, Shanahan said, “To put it bluntly, we are not performing to the standards and expectations we have for ourselves or for each other. This is unacceptable. We cannot shrink from facing the challenge head on.”

In a separate statement, Marine Corps Commandant Gen. Robert Neller echoed those sentiments.

“In the end, this is an issue of trust — trust that fellow

Marines will look after each other, trust they will not be assaulted, and trust their command will take appropriate action," he said. "Only Marines who trust and respect each other can be fully prepared to fight and win our nation's battles."

In February, defense officials announced the number of cases of unwanted sexual encounters at the military service academies has increased almost 50 percent since 2016. Last fall, a report from the RAND Corporation found that more than 10 percent of all women experienced a sexual assault at "high-risk" installations inside the military.

According to the SAPR report, 43 percent of women who reported a sexual assault to military authorities said it prompted "perceived negative experiences," including additional harassment and abuse. That number was up from less than one-third in fiscal 2016.

However, cases of retaliation for reports were down, from 26 percent in fiscal 2016 to 21 percent in fiscal 2018. Shanahan has said he will consider strengthening criminal penalties for that behavior as part of the upcoming military legal review.

No Veterans Die Alone

On September 20th I got my first call to utilize my services for No Veterans Die Alone (NVDA). I was eager and a bit anxious all at the same time. When I arrived at the Portland VA Hosp at 6:45pm. I was greeted by the chaplain who proceeded to walk me to the vet's room while giving me a quick briefing. I asked the chaplain if he had a belief system, and she informed me that he was a Christian. Having the same belief system brought me some comfort on how to proceed once in the room. Upon arrival to his room, I was met by the nurse, who also gave me a small briefing. I asked him if I could play some worship music in the room and he said "yes." Once I was left alone with our vet, I pulled up a chair next to his bed and took a couple minutes to just get my thoughts together on what I should do next. I went straight into introducing myself. I told him I was a Marine vet and was so glad to be sitting there with him.

I then proceeded to thank him for his service to our country, and that his service mattered. I then told him I was happy to hear his love for the Lord and that I did, too. I told the vet that I was going to put on some worship music for us to listen too. After about two minutes of just listening to the music, I felt this urge to tell the vet that God was so happy about his homecoming and that he would no longer be suffering. I told him it was okay now to leave, that Jesus was waiting and he was going home to our Father in heaven. Right after I spoke that last word, I watched him take his last peaceful breath. It was surreal, touching, and forever engraved in my heart.

The vet's two children were with their father the whole day and just left to grab some dinner prior to my arrival there. I let the nurse know and he confirmed his passing and said we needed to wait for a physician to call time of death. He said I could leave, and I said I would like to stay until his family comes back. I didn't feel right leaving him alone. We are trained to never leave a man behind and I wasn't planning on it now. I waited in his room for about an hour and half, just listening to worship music and being present. I kept thinking, that is what I would hope someone would do for me. After

arrival of his children, we gave them the opportunity to grieve alone, and when they were done, I shared with them the events leading up to his passing. They just cried and said they were so thankful I was there, although they wished they had been there when it happened. (Chaplain told them more times than not, the patient waits for the family to leave before they pass). They continued to say that he would have been so happy to know that I was a vet and that I stayed with him the whole time.

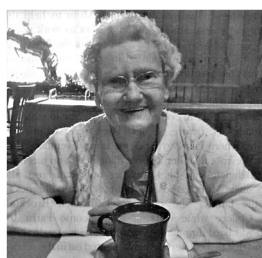
The staff then came to let us know that they had prepared him (also covered in the American Flag) for the final passing through the halls of the hospital. Myself, the family that was there along with the chaplain and other hospital staff lined the hallways while they played "Taps" through the speaker system. Once he was wheeled in front of me, I saluted while tears filled my eyes at the joy I felt to be a small part of this vet's story.

After it was all done, hugs were shared with the family and we said our goodbyes. I know each case will present differently but I feel confident I will be able to adapt to each case and be a small part of bringing them some sort of peace, love, and comfort while I am there. I already got a second call six days later. The vet's wife was with them, and I had the opportunity to speak with the spouse, bring them some comfort. The spouse said I could pray for them, so I did, and it was a lovely and special time for me. I then spoke to the vet directly & thanked him for his service, and that I was a Marine Vet like him. I then proceeded to say, "Ooh Rah Devil Dog," and gave him a salute. I know he heard and understood me as right at that moment, the vet moved his head a couple times and tried making sounds. It was so precious! I left the room so his spouse could have the remaining time alone (about 7 hours later he passed).

That time was different but equally important to me as I hope it was for the spouse I got to comfort and the vet that I got to speak with before his passing.

I'm enclosing the last page of my mom, Sgt Velma F. Mooney's, magazine from you. My mom moved to Heaven on Ash Wednesday, March 6. She loved being a Marine and was so proud. Each week she volunteered at the Brockton VA Hospital. She was a celebrity at the VA. All knew her. She made them smile and will be GREATLY missed by them, our family, and all that knew her. She was a disabled veteran from the time she was in the service, but never let that slow her down in helping others. One of her favorite times was being with the veterans at the Elks Lodge for a special dinner once a month. That's actually where she got sick on December 13. She passed out, and was taken by ambulance to the ER. I was told she was dying and had three days to live and that I should do what's best for her. Well, I did. I prayed and advocated for her because she loved life and would want everything done to help her. She was transferred from there to Boston where they did an amazing job fighting for her life. They would give me bad reports of what she was going through and offered me no hope, but as a person of strong faith, I believed in miracles, and she



had many. She had a UTI and pneumonia that turned into sepsis. She overcame a port, breathing tubes, blood transfusions, and a tracheotomy. After being sedated for almost four weeks, she woke up and was transferred to a rehab shortly after where she continued to improve.

She had physical therapy, was taken off the breathing machine and had the trach removed! I will never forget hearing her speak for the first time after. When I told her I loved her, she was able to say she loved me back. The day she was being transferred to a nursing rehab facility to strengthen her walking so she could go home, she suddenly got sick. From that point on it was a challenge because she got CDIF, which was caused by all the antibiotics. Within five days her vitals slipped and she got sepsis again. I was with her holding her hand and my other hand was on her chest. I told her she was here for my first breath and I would be there for her last. And I was. She slipped peacefully into the arms of Jesus, no more sorrow, no more pain, no more walker.

When I went to tell those who knew her at the VA, one of the women told me a story that really blessed me. She told me that a week before Mom moved to Heaven, she called the VA and told them she had been sick but was much better and would be back to volunteer. That was her heart till the end.

I wanted to let you know so you can stop her subscription. Although it's sad not to have her here each morning, I have coffee in her Marine Corps mug and listen to one of the ten voice messages on my answering machine from her. As I'm sorting through all of her treasures, I have found so many special things that I didn't know about her. Her neighbor gave me a bunch of letters Mom had written to her. I had no idea what she went through! And I found out that she was in the second platoon of women Marines!

My mom didn't like flowers, so at her showing I had her treasures throughout the funeral home. My friend called it "The Velma Museum." At her service I had the Marines' Hymn played near the end. She was laid to rest in her women Marines jacket, too.

I have volunteered at the Brockton VA Hospital for over 12 years. Next month I'll be honored for my 500 hours. The last time I was honored was for 300 hours, and my mom was also honored for her volunteer time. What a mother/daughter legacy!

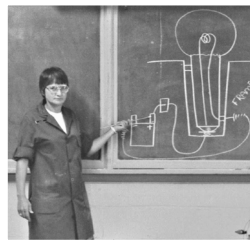

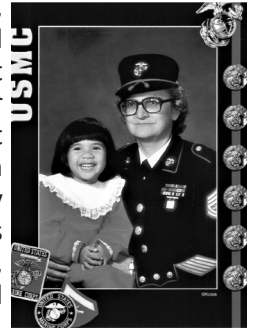
Elaine A. Plasse, AKA Snoopy (73), retired Gunnery Sergeant serving 21 years (1969 – 1990) in the United States Marine Corps, passed away on Memorial Day 27 May 2019. She was a multi-talented person who met challenges that came with her pursuing her interest and desires. Her first few years in the Marines she served through the later part of the Vietnam War and became a driver for auto parts delivery and received a couple Driver of the Month awards. In 1977, she became the first female Staff NCO to instruct



at Camp Johnson (formerly Montford Point) in Jacksonville, NC. She taught fuel and electrical mechanics in motor transport, predominantly all male students, on how to repair vehicles and to keep them in operational order prior to the student's assignment to a military motor pool. She said she

was considered for a "trial run" because everyone in rank above her thought she couldn't do it since she was a "female and supposedly not capable of teaching a bunch of young Marines" or "the guys won't take the class seriously because she's a woman and wouldn't know what she was talking about". She proved those higher in command to be wrong and received a Meritorious Mast in 1980 to this hard-earned achievement.

Having received more training over the next few years in the field and military, she obtained countless degrees in auto mechanics, Meritorious Mast, marksmanship and other degree interest in carpentry and electricity to become a licensed electrician. In 1986, the Marine Corps sent her to Oshkosh, WI to take a 3-week training program called "LVS 3rd & 4th Echelon Maintenance Course," which taught her to maintain and operate a five-ton truck that loads and unloads huge dockside containers that the Marines use for shipment to and from the seas. With her 5' 2" slender frame, salt and pepper hair, military button up, khakis, combat boots and dog tags around her neck, one can only imagine what she looked like in the driver's seat or under the five-ton truck checking out some aspect of maintenance. When she wasn't teaching, she kept busy with other extracurricular activities as in traveling, bowling competitions, photography, collecting stamps and various Snoopy items.



When she finally was ready to retire in 1990, she adopted her daughter from the Philippines and moved to Bedford, VA to settle down on a patch of farmland where she was the "Jane of all Trades." Unfortunately, retirement was short-lived. She didn't even get to unpack the moving boxes when she was called back for Desert Storm. When she was finally back home to settle down, she specialized in heating & air, then later welding. Eventually she moved on to gain her CDL and drove trailer truck across the US for a of couple years. Officially retiring in 2000 and soon to have an empty nest she still couldn't just sit at home. She upkeep her properties, started a little goat farm and worked part-time as a delivery driver for a local flower shop where every flower arrangement found its recipient.

First underwater veterans' memorial is open for divers



It wasn't the typical ribbon cutting ceremony. Instead of standing in front of some building, Heyward Matthews, a professor of oceanography at St. Petersburg College, wielded the oversized scissors in the water and cut a ribbon strung between two boats.

That's because Matthews was dedicating the opening of the nation's first underwater dive memorial honoring veterans, located 40 feet below the surface 10 miles off the coast of Dunedin Beach, FL.



Matthews has been pushing the idea for the "Circle of Heroes" for almost 10 years. "(I) just wanted something that was going to be permanent and also wanted something that was going to honor our veterans in a unique and different way," Matthews told the Military Times in June.

In addition to honoring veterans, Mathews would like the memorial to be a therapeutic dive site for disabled veterans suffering from post-traumatic stress disorder and depression. He also wants it to serve as an artificial reef in order to help sustain marine life in the gulf.

The memorial currently features 12 life-size concrete statues depicting men and women from each of the five service branches. The statues will be arranged in a 100-foot circle facing a pentagon shaped memorial containing bronze emblems of each of the five service branches. The statues' 2,000-pound bases also contain plaques with names of service members.



In total, the memorial will have 24 statues, the remaining 12 statues are expected to be installed in 2020 in order to complete the 100-foot Circle of Heroes.

The statues were made possible

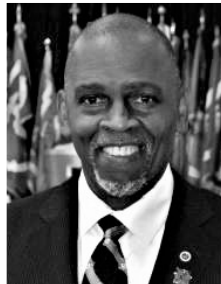
through the cooperation of private businesses, community donors and Pinellas County. Spearheading the campaign to complete the memorial is a non-profit created by former Congressman David Jolly, known as Brighter Future Florida. Jolly is Matthews' nephew and spoke today during the memorial's dedication ceremony.

Chaplain's Corner



Every quarter I look for something to inspire us to achieve more than we thought possible. Our sister, Elaine, seems to have hit the mark: she did it her way, and she did it well, as all who knew her will remember and love about her.

Elaine Rumph Geib was born Goldie Elaine Rumph in Bend, OR on March 29, 1923. She went to her Lord at the VA Hospital at Ft. Meade in Sturgis, SD on April 30, 2019, close to her home in Nisland, SD. Elaine will be remembered by friends and family and honored with a military service at the VA Cemetery at 11am on July 5, 2019, in Miles City, MT, and a reception at the VFW at 1 pm.

Elaine and her brother Duane started 1st grade together at the one room Baking Powder Creek School in Powder River County, which they attended for two years before the family sold their homestead and moved briefly to Denver, CO before moving to Miles City, MT. They graduated from Custer County High School in 1941.

After the bombing of Pearl Harbor, Elaine moved to California with her father where they both found jobs at Ryan Aircraft in San Diego. Elaine worked there until she proudly enlisted in the Women's Marine Reserves and was in the first set of recruits to go to Camp Lejeune. She was trained as a radio operator at Miami University in Ohio and then transferred to an airbase in El Centro, where she and her friends often hitched rides in order to spend weekends with her family in San Diego. She deployed to Hawaii for the remainder of the war where she had fond memories of good friends and Hawaiian culture.

After the war was over, she moved with her family back to Montana where she met and married John Weber Geib. They had two children, Teresa Ann and Bradley Carlton. She raised her young family, after leaving John, by working as a rancher, bookkeeper, secretary, and traffic manager at KATL Radio. She also taught at Spring Creek and Divide Schools in Custer County.

Elaine, ever the entrepreneur, leased the Husky Truckstop Café in Miles City, which was popular and profitable. She lost her lease and moved to Billings for work. Then she moved to Ashland where she and the kids were living when Brad was diagnosed with leukemia. Elaine moved to Miles City to take care of Brad where he passed away just after his 15th birthday in July 1965.

In 1967, Elaine married Joe Considine and they entered the exotic cattle business on the old Rumph/Considine homesteads at Butte Creek near Broadus. They developed registered limousine cattle bloodlines and built a reputation for excellence. Her grandkids, Desiree (Klein) Johnson and J.D. Klein to this day cite spending summers gardening, painting, competing in rodeos, and working on the ranch for their Marine Corps grandmother as among the most joyful and formative experiences of their lives.

Elaine was an aficionado and expert in whatever she set her mind to including oil painting, gardening, cattle breeding, building things, collecting fine crystal and china, and of course, her animals. She bred show quality Persian cats and Angora rabbits. Elaine took great pride in developing animals

with exquisite features and personalities.

Elaine's artistic ability was remarkable and known to many. Her creativity ranged widely from early abstract oil paintings, pencil and charcoal sketches, portraits, and realistic depictions of wildlife in nature's splendor. She taught her grandkids how to bring a landscape to life on canvas by sitting on a dusty prairie knoll, capturing the vista with pencil and then translating every detail to oil on canvas media.

In 1986, Elaine started an Angora goat business and successfully launched a partnership with BLM to graze leafy spurge from public lands. She grew her herd eventually to over 700 goats while grazing the Powder River valley and Moorhead areas.

In the fall of 1988, Elaine and Joe divorced and she moved to her new home on a ranch in Nisland. Elaine, then in her 60s and starting with nothing, rolled up her sleeves as she'd always done, built her sheds by hand and continued the BLM projects with her 4 herding dogs, riding her dirt bike motorcycle, and planning her retirement.

She was joined at her home in Nisland in her last year by daughter Teresa, and was kept company by her beloved Samoyed Tyka, and of course a few cats, her handsome Tom Turkey, and a handful of geese and chickens.

Elaine is survived by daughter Teresa Klein Bacon (Mark) of Windsor, CO; two grandchildren; five great grandchildren; one brother; one sister; nieces and nephews.

In her own words, Elaine lived an interesting, happy and diversified life that aside from a few bumps along the way, she wouldn't trade for anything.

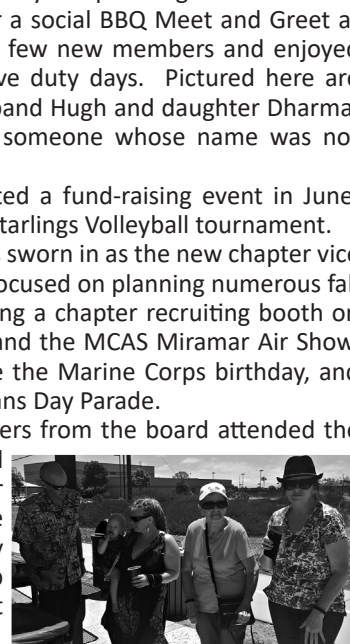
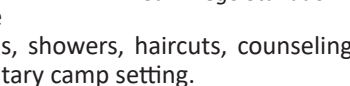

We are in the process of getting more community participation by asking other Costco stores, etc. in areas where members live to also contribute.

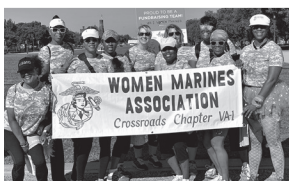
